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Sport and Recreation

Aim

The aim of the Department of Sport and Recreation is to improve the mental and physical wellbeing of the community by promoting local sport and recreation, as well as international sport and recreation relations and participation.

Policy developments

In April 1999, Cabinet approved the establishment of a national Sports Commission that would assume the functions of the Department of Sport and Recreation and incorporate the National Sports Council. It was envisaged that both these entities would be disbanded once the Commission has been established. In January 2000, Cabinet decided to retain a small Department tasked with the responsibility of policy formulation.

In the 1999 Budget, the Minister announced a government contribution of R48,2 million to the All Africa Games. In the 1999 Adjustment Estimate, a further R31,1 million was allocated to the Games.

The 1999/00 budget included a once-off transfer of R79,3 million for the 1999 All Africa Games. The Sports Commission will carry out most of the current activities of the Department, and some staff will be moved to the Commission. As a result, personnel and other current expenditure decreases from R40 million in 1999/00 to R15 million in 2002/03 and transfers to other institutions, excluding the All Africa Games, increases from R10,9 million in 1999/00 to R42 million in 2000/01.

As noted, the *Sport and recreation* programme combines a number of programmes previously listed in the Department's budget. It consists mainly of transfers to agencies and institutions that deliver services according to the objectives of the Department. The South African Sports Commission will receive R22 million in 2000/01, while R3 million is earmarked for South Africa's participation in the Sydney 2000 Olympic Games. Transfers are also made to national sporting and recreation federations and the Institute for Drug-free Sport.

The 1999 Budget allocated R85,6 million to the *Sport and recreation* programme. An additional amount of R31,1 million was voted to the All Africa Games in the 1999 Adjustments Estimates and an amount of R7,5 million was rolled over from the previous year.

The baseline estimates on this programme are revised upwards to R45,6 million in 2000/01, R43,9 million in 2001/02 and R45,9 million in 2002/03. This reflects a smaller allocation for *Administration* as some of the administrative functions have been transferred to the Sports Commission.

In 1999/00 the Department:

- Conducted random drug testing of participants in 140 sport bodies.
- Collated data on 140 sport federations, three macro-organisations and over 4 million participants.
- Screened 9 000 children and 300 teachers, predominantly in rural and disadvantaged areas, to identify sporting talent.
- Targeted 800 athletes from 26 codes of sport for high-performance training.

The Department has also contributed to the costs of 208 basic outdoor facilities since 1994, while an indoor facility has been built in each of the nine provinces.

Outside agencies, such as the Sports Commission, Institute for Drug-free Sport and research institutes, will deliver more of the Department's services. The Department provides transfers to 72 of the 140 national sport and recreation federations. Provinces and local government are also playing an increasing role in providing sport and recreation facilities, particularly to poor and rural communities.

The Department will provide technical support to the Soccer World Cup bid, and assist in marketing the bid domestically and internationally.
