Details of adjustments to Estimates of National Expenditure 2005

Roll-overs – R35,279 million

Programme 1: Administration

R5,279 million has been rolled over for a disaster recovery system which could not be delivered before the end of 2004/05.

Programme 2: Economic Statistics

R30 million has been rolled over for an improved collection methodology for the income and expenditure survey (IES), which includes the need for more fieldworkers and vehicles and more frequent collections.

Details of savings

Programme 1: Administration

Savings of R3,238 million are due to unfilled vacant posts. Further savings of R2,702 million are because the costs for software and SITA computer services are now carried by provincial offices.

Programme 4: Quality and Integration

Savings of R6,3 million are due to unfilled vacant posts.

Programme 5: Statistical Support & Informatics

Savings of R8,976 million are due to unfilled vacant posts and delays in opening regional offices because of delays in the community survey.

Utilisation of savings

Programme 2: Economic Statistics

R3,642 million has been used for the CPI direct price collection (R1,99 million) and to increase the sample size of the economic activity survey (R1,652 million).

Programme 3: Population and Social Statistics

R17,574 million has been used for the second phase of the causes of death project (R2 million) and for the shortfall in the funding for the Social Statistics subprogramme (R15,574 million), specifically for training new fieldworkers for data collection.

Virements within a programme

Programme 2: Economic Statistics

Savings of R5,718 million on goods and services in the Industry and Trade Statistics subprogramme have been shifted to Employment and Price Statistics to increase the sample size for the economic activity survey.

Other adjustments – (R9,112 million)

Shifting of funds between votes

Programme 3: Population and Social Statistics

R9,112 million has been shifted to the Department of Public Works for rental for an additional 20 regional offices to improve the data collection process during field surveys, and for additional office space in Pretoria as the current head office facilities are inadequate.
