## POLICY DEVELOPMENTS AND EXPENDITURE IMPLICATIONS

**Sports commission** Government has approved proposals from the Department of Sport and Recreation for it to be merged with the National Sports Council to form a Commission on Sport and Recreation as proposed by the 1998 Sports Commission Act.

Government will delegate to the Commission responsibility for policy formulation on sport and recreation. The MTEF allocations listed above are indicative amounts depending on the final responsibilities of the Commission and its legal relationship with Government.

- All Africa Games The City of Johannesburg will host the All Africa Games in September 1999 with the full backing of the Cabinet. The Games signify South Africa's commitment to African sport, and national government is providing a one-off grant of R48 million to the organising committee.
- **Changes from earlier** indicative allocations The allocations to the Department have not changed from the MTEF allocations of the 1998/99 budget, and represent a small nominal increase on a year-on-year basis.
- **Role of the Department** As South Africa becomes integrated into the sporting world, its sports people and administrators have a potentially larger role to promote the country. However, the provision of sporting facilities and resources, including experts, is still highly distorted, favouring rich urban communities. These two factors justify more resources, but must be balanced with Government's commitment to its core social responsibilities and to economic investment to enhance long-term prosperity.

The MTEF allocations to the Department reflect this balance. The Department will have to provide a wider range of services to more people with fewer resources in real terms. Priorities in the sector need to be appraised carefully to ensure that South Africa is able to maintain its high quality of sports persons while ordinary people have equal access to the benefits of sport.

Most of the expenditure in the *Sport advancement* programme comprises transfers to national sport federations for the promotion of sport locally and abroad and for incentives to sport achievers. South Africa's participation in the international sporting arena requires spending on grants, membership fees to international sporting bodies and the fostering of international sport relations. The programme also includes the grant for the All Africa Games.
