1. OVERVIEW

1.1 Vision

A competitive and adaptive economy that improves the quality of life of all people in the province.

1.2 Mission

To facilitate, implement and co-ordinate integrated planning and stimulate sustainable economic development.

2. REVIEW OF THE CURRENT FINANCIAL YEAR (2006/2007)

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Enterprise Development Directorate was able to establish the Small Enterprise Development Agency (SEDA) in the province. SEDA has successfully established four branches to provide non-financial support to SMME's in the province. 13 service providers were assessed and capacitated by SEDA on Cooperatives and general business management. 600 enterprises were assisted to access finance and training through the Nkomazi Economic Development Unit. The South African Micro-Enterprise APEX Fund was launched to assist rural enterprises to access finance. The Nicro enterprise Finance was established in Secunda to support young entrepreneurs to access funding. The finalization of the merger between MEEC and MII has assisted SMME's in the province to access funds. One of the highlights for 2006/07 has been the promotion of Cooperatives as a new form of ownership and support to targeted groups.

The BEE directorate was established in July 2006, after consultation with role players and BEE focus groups. The Tourism BEE Charter was launched and a workshop was held on the accreditation of BEE verification agencies.

The Mining Preferential Procurement Initiative was launched in June 2006. Interactions are taking place with the mining companies to implement MMEPPI to assist the BEE companies to get procurement deals within the mining industry .The Export Awards event took place on the 16th of November 2006, which was an event aimed to inculcate a culture of exporting for small exporters. It included 3 categories; small, medium and large in most sectors.

The department participated in 5 different domestic and international trade exhibitions, viz Export Africa 2006, "One of Kind" Exhibition in August, SAITEX in September, FACIM in Mozambique in October and AF 'Lartigiano in Fiera selling exhibition in Italy during December where 35 small and large exporters had to sell their wares and get trade deals. An International Trade Administration (ITAC) workshop was held at Crocodile Country Inn during November 2006. The ITAC workshop was intended to create awareness of the organisation as well as detailing their functions of import/export regulations to the exporters in general. Two International investment conferences was attended in London and Brussels represented by the Director: Trade & Industry and MEGA representatives

On the 1st of April 2006 the Horse Racing and Betting Ordinance 24 of 1978 were transferred to the Mpumalanga Gambling Board. The Agency Agreement between the department and the Gauteng Gambling Board was subsequently terminated and the Provincial Gambling Board (MGB) is now dealing with all regulations and operations pertaining to horse racing matters. An Agency Agreement was signed between the department and the MGB expressly ensuring accountability and accuracy on revenue collections. In terms of the agreement, MGB must report to the department monthly and quarterly on all horse racing matters.

The Mpumalanga Liquor Licensing Bill was published on the 24th of March 2006 for general comments. The Notice and the Bill were published in the Provincial Gazette Extraordinary, Gazette No 1324, Volume 13. As per Cabinet Resolution the Bill was published for comment for 30 days and the comment stage was closed on 24 April 2006. On the 20th of September 2006, the Executive Council approved the contents of the Mpumalanga Liquor Licensing Bill 2006 and gave further approval to introduce it to the Provincial Legislature. The department is now awaiting an invitation to address the Bill.

The Consumer Protector was appointed who will deal with all matters on unfair business practices. This office will submit serious cases to the Consumer Court. The post of Clerk of the Consumer Court has been advertised and is currently in the process of being filled. The Consumer Services Section resolved 800 cases out of 1100. The monetary value of the cases resolved amounts to approximately R2million.

Various educational programmes were held through various radio stations within Mpumalanga. Awareness campaigns on festive buying were conducted in all the regions. A workshop focusing on people with disabilities was held in the Ekangala region. Focus for the last quarter will be mainly on the World Consumer Day which, is to be held on the 15 March 2007. The Educational Programmes managed to reach approximately 1 million consumers in the province. It is envisaged that the majority of the population of the province will be made aware of Consumer Rights through the World Consumer Day.

ECONOMIC PLANNING

The program will focus on formulating provincial economic policy priorities, and drive integrated economic planning. It will also drive and co-ordinate provincial economic research, provide economic development information and information intelligence services, as well as determining the impact and effectiveness of economic policy priorities, strategies and targeted intervention programmes in the province. The programme will focus on economic research and development to support economic development initiatives in identifying opportunities for investment and value addition, job creation and poverty elimination. It will also drive and monitor integrated planning, which will enhance the economic performance in the province, as well as, provision and maintenance of quality information management services for strategic decision making.

The current financial year has been hampered by a strategic plan that was not in line with the organizational structure, hence, resulting in a high vacancy rate and in turn affecting the movement on goods and services. Functions such as Provincial LED Strategy Development and Strategic Initiatives have ceased to be core functions in the new programme. The programme was transferred to the LED programme (Programme 2: Integrated Economic Development Services). The previous functions under Strategic Initiatives are now delegated amongst the five new programmes.

3. OUTLOOK FOR THE COMING FINANCIAL YEAR (2007/2008)

The Enterprise Development Unit will be focusing more on strengthening the work done by the Small Enterprise Development Agency [SEDA], as well as the monitoring of the activities of the new Mpumalanga Economic Growth Agency. The unit will review the current strategy for the promotion of SMME's in the province in line with the latest empowerment process. The strategy for Co-operatives in the province will be finalized. Other financial institutions will be encouraged to relocate to the province. Particular attention will be paid to the support given to targeted groups such as women, youth and people with disabilities in the implementation of the empowerment programmes.

The Economic Empowerment programme will focus on developing the provincial BEE strategy and creating awareness on BEE in the province. Advocacy meetings with big corporations will be held and the Codes of Good Practice communicated.

One flagship project (Maputo Development Corridor) will be co-ordinated. It will also be participating in the Moloto Development Corridor with key infrastructural and product development and sectoral development projects.

In Moloto Development Corridor, the department will work closely with the Department of Roads and Transport, whilst identifying possible economic opportunities, along the corridor.

Major specific projects will be pursued, which were identified by the sector studies in various growth sectors such as:

- Tourism: Pilgrim's Rest Historical Town Rejuvenation and Redevelopment.
- International Convention Centre, Mpumalanga Tourism Call Centre.
- Agro-processing sector such as the Apples Project, Tobacco Smoke Control Devise Project, KMIA Vegetable Project, Bio-fuels Project and the Agro-pharmaceutical Project.
- Petro-chemical Sector: Water Treatment Chemicals Project.

Capacity building and Incubation programmes will be amongst the key ASGISA interventions through skills transfer, upskilling and re-skilling of labour force to meet the demands of the provincial economy.

These will include the following:

- Programme for Industrial Manufacturiong Excellence (PRIME).
- Export Resource Network (ERN).
- Carbon Steel and Stainless Steel Value Addition Programmes.
- Mining Procurement Capacity Building.
- Mpumalanga Regional Tooling Initiative.
- Furniture Technology Centre Programmes.

The department will further look at broadening its scope of intervention in most key sectors of the province such as participation in general metals rather than only stainless steel. These interventions will create an inclusive economy that diversity, add value, absorb labour and encourage new business initiatives.

Another section that requires to be pursued for major job creation is the services sector specifically, Business Processing Outsourcing (BPO)

The Kruger-Malelane Junction Edutainment Centre is supported which integrates entertainment and indigenous educational facilities for arts, crafts and cultured programmes.

With reference to the Greening, Heritage and Tourism Flagship, a number of huge tourism conservation projects will be developed:

- Blyde River Canyon Cable Way with accommodation facilities earmarked.
- Kruger National Park Belt Development with lodges.
- Greater Limpopo Trans-frontier Park
- Lubombo Trans-frontier Park
- Barberton Museum Development
- Malolotja Songimvelo Trans-frontier Park

It is envisaged that the Provincial Horse Racing Bill will be promulgated during the 2007/8 financial year. The Bill will incorporate current developments in the Industry and be aligned to National Policy and Legislation on Horse Racing matters. Once the Horse Racing Bill is promulgated, the Horse Racing and Betting Ordinance 24 of 1978 will be repealed.

The department has to promulgate and assent the Mpumalanga Liquor Bill into legislation. This Legislation will dramatically change the structure of the current liquor Board in that the proposed Bill seeks to establish a parastatal outside the department, with an independent budget. The Executive Council and Treasury still have to be engaged on the above matter.

The department will be conducting the World Consumer Day in the last quarter of the financial year. By making the necessary staff appointments and the establishment of the office for prohibition of unfair Business Practices the Consumer Services Unit will increase its capacity to resolve cases. The department together with the National Department of Trade and Industry will continue to conduct awareness campaigns on the National Credit Act throughout the province.

The Economic Planning Programme will concentrate on developing an integrated economic plan emanating from the sector studies done in 2006/7. It will further work on the research that was conducted to determine economic development opportunities on the proposed Moloto Development Corridor. The finalisation of three research projects; KMIA Industrial Park, a strategy to revitalise mining towns will be developed as well as the output on the market survey on the Komatipoort Dry Port. The programme will further ensure that statistical information is communicated to the relevant stakeholders on, at least, a monthly basis.
