#### 1. Overview

### Core functions and responsibilities

The core mandate of the Department of Public Works is to provide and manage government's building infrastructure. This includes accommodation (office and residential), provision of leadership to and regulating the construction and property industries and related professions.

According to the Government-wide Immovable Asset Management Act (GIAMA), Public Works is required to regulate the management of State Immovable assets, including providing expert advice and uniform guidelines, norms and standards for the management of these assets. The Department supports user departments in the development of User Asset Management Plans (UAMP's) in terms of the spirit and letter of GIAMA.

In addition to Asset Management, the Department is also responsible for Land Management and Administration. This function requires Public Works to facilitate all processes that lead to proof of ownership of Provincial Immovable Assets. The Department is also responsible for coordinating the implementation of the Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP).

The Department of Public Works is a key stakeholder in the Infrastructure Delivery Improvement Programme (IDIP). This programme was designed by the Development Bank of Southern Africa and the

Construction Industry Development Board to enable infrastructure departments to plan, procure and implement all infrastructure projects. Infrastructure skills in the form of artisans, and professionals (engineers, quantity surveyors, and architects etc.) are a sore point for the entire country in the face of massive infrastructure development. As a contribution in addressing the scarce skills problem affecting the property and construction industries, the Department initiated the Accelerated Professional and Trade Competencies Development (APTCoD) programme as the Skills Development initiative aimed at developing the artisan and professional skills. The APTCoD programme was launched in 2007 in the OR Tambo Region to address the industry skill shortages with an intention to expand the initiative to other regions in the Province.

The National Government has recently developed and approved a National Infrastructure Maintenance Strategy (NIMS) in recognition of the role that infrastructure investment contributes to economic growth, job creation and poverty alleviation. Infrastructure investment and maintenance will further improve infrastructure performance and enhance service delivery. In this context therefore, The National Infrastructure Maintenance Strategy provides for a co-ordinated programme of action that is an essential part of government's vision of delivering infrastructure services to all.

The department's business plan is informed by the Provincial Growth and Development Strategy, the Growth and Development Summit outcomes of District municipalities, the High Impact Priority Projects, ASGISA, the JIPSA and other provincial as well as national priority programmes.

#### Vision

A Department of Public Works that ensures the provision and management of high quality and accessible buildings infrastructure in the Eastern Cape.

#### Mission

To achieve optimal efficiency, convenience, lifespan, economic viability, safety and appearance of any building or structure within our custodianship, by employing the most effective, labour-intensive and economic means at our disposal, while at the same time contributing to the broader government goals of job creation, poverty alleviation and the fight against the HIV and AIDS pandemic.

#### **Main Services**

In line with the core functions and responsibilities the main services rendered by the department include the following:

- Provision of technical support and technical advisory support, project and contracts management services to and on behalf of client departments. This service includes quality control through provision of inspectorate services.
- Give assistance to client departments in respect of routine and planned maintenance.
- Acquisition and disposal of State owned properties through efficient negotiation and management of leases on behalf of government departments.
- Provide coordinating support to the implementation of the Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP).
- Coordinate initiatives and programmes that would contribute towards the transformation of the Construction and Property Industries.
- Provide assistance to the emerging businesses in the construction and property sectors towards their growth and development.
- In carrying out its mandate, the Department of Public Works embodies the following values

- Employees' diversity and the continuous development
- Professional and excellent customer service
- Upholding and promotion of Batho Pele Principles

# Demands and changes in services

Public Works provides 51 000m² in state owned properties in the province. There is a lease portfolio of 59 000m² from private landlords. The Office of the Premier requires at least 6 000m² additional office space at the Bhisho Headquarters. A demand for office space for the other departments combined at Bhisho is 39 000m². The total office space requirements for the regional offices in the Alfred Nzo Region are 21 000m², excluding the current developments at Mount Frere (5 000m²). The other requirements in the various regions add to a total office space requirement of 52 000m². The total provincial office space requirements registered is 118 000m². To meet the demands for the Bhisho and Alfred Nzo requirements, PPP's have been registered and a transaction advisor has been appointed through a tender. The 52 000m² required for the Province is being tendered for, using the Broad Based Black Economic Empowerment (BBBEE) instruments for emerging landlords. There will be tender processes to convert the 59 000m² lease portfolio into empowerment tenders for emerging landlords.

In addition to the provision of the office accommodation facilities, Public Works is required to exercise custodian functions to all provincially owned properties. The department will also manage the devolution of the rates and taxes with effect from 1 April 2008. There is an increasing demand for the construction of new facilities for client departments in order for them to provide services. The Department of Health has to construct 193 clinics, rehabilitate and upgrade 13 hospitals and implement 26 other capital projects. In order to quantify the requirements for recurrent maintenance and other revitalization programmes, a detailed audit and condition assessment of hospitals and clinics will be required.

The Department of Education has a plan to implement 13 projects in the special schools programme, 331 projects to replace mud structures and rapid response on disaster and emergency repairs. There is a demand to implement 7 new projects for the Department of Social Development and 11 projects for the Department of Sports, Recreation, Arts and Culture. In order to provide adequate support in the delivery of the service delivery infrastructure, the department has implemented the IDIP model, starting with Education and Health. The stage was set for the capacitation of the department to enable it to provide planning, implementation and monitoring as well as the maintenance of built environment standards. For the past three years, the department has been involved in the coordination processes for the implementation of Expanded Public Works Programme. There is a demand for the Department to drive the implementation processes of EPWP. This function requires the upgrading of the Public Works capacity to provide effective monitoring and evaluation of EPWP programmes and projects.

The transformation imperatives of the construction and property industries require the Department to implement empowerment programmes in terms of the Broad Based Black Economic Empowerment Act. Processes are under way to empower emerging contractors, building material suppliers and consulting firms in the construction industry. There is a requirement to implement the same on emerging estate agents, property developers and property management companies.

### 2. Review of the current financial year (2007/08)

The 2007/08 financial year has seen a mixture of progressive achievements and persistent challenges that have a potential to discount the otherwise aplaudable progress. During the year under review our focus has been to streamline our programmes so as to maximise our contribution towards the attainment of the socioeconomic goals of the province and the country. These efforts have proved to be a success as indicated by the achievements listed below:

#### 2.1 Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP)

The Department has accelerated the implementation of the EPWP. The Department has appointed sector support personnel and field workers in each region/district to improve the performance of the sectors as well as the coordination of information. Through the EPWP the Province has created 39 492 job opportunities and 197 jobs as at mid-term, against the target of 15000 for the same period and an annual target of 40 000. This is by far excellent performance second only to KwaZulu-Natal (KZN). This figure indicates that the Province is poised to double its annual target.

For the period under-review, 52 703 persons days of training was provided. This number is complemented by 220 contractor learnerships currently in the programme. In collaboration with Coega Development Corporation, the department has developed a contractor learnership model with 51 participating contractor learnerships. This model has been voted the best entrepreneur development programme in the country.In order sustain the progress and maximise outputs, new specifications have been developed. The specification enforces the infusion of EPWP, and other socio economic principles at project design and tender stages. This will ensure that all infrastructure projects have socio economic indicators and therefore benefits.

### 2.2 Construction Industry Development Programme (CIDP)

The main focus of this programme is to grow, develop, and empower emerging contractors so that they participate in the mainstream of the economy. We do this by first and foremost ensuring that their registration status is improved. Numerous programmes have been initiated to realise the foregoing objective and these include:

- The establishment of Contractor Contact Centre, this centre is meant to assist contractors with all construction industry related problems to ensure that contractors are empowered. The centre was launched in October 2007. The initiative is complemented by;
- Tender Advice Centres, which have been established in regions. The purpose of these centres is to advise contractors on all tender related matters.
- The registration status of contractors in the Province has improved. 4883 contractors have been registered with an improvement of 124 Emerging contractors having moved to higher grades; Grade 2-68; Grade 3-18; Grade 4-12; Grade 5-14; Grade 6-12.

As a way of ensuring that contractors are assisted to develop into formidable businesses in a sustainable manner, the department has initiated an incubator programme targeting 10 contractors in each region with a deliberate emphasis on women and youth contractors. All the modalities of the programme have been put in place and the programme is ready to fly. As a response to the problem of technical and professional skills shortage and as a contribution to the national effort, the department has initiated an infrastructure skills development programme which is aimed at developing artisans and professionals. Furthermore the department in collaboration with the Portfolio Committee on Public Works has successfully hosted a 2nd Annual Contractor's Conference.

# 2.3 Property Management

The appointment of a Senior Manager: Property Manager has strengthened the Department' service delivery capacity. In response to the shortage of office space for government departments a number of initiatives have been put on course. These include the initiation of the development of a Bhisho Office Park project which is part of a bigger programme to revitalize Bhisho within the context of King Williams Town — Bhisho development corridor, which is part of the Buffalo City and provincial government partnership development programme. A Public Private Partnership as a funding model for this initiative has since been registered. A transaction advisor has also been appointed and the project manager for the PPP projects. The PPP initiative is going to be responsible for the development of Bhisho Office Park, Mt Ayliff Office Complex and other projects of a similar nature.

The Department has started with the implementation of the Government-wide Immovable Asset Management Act (GIAMA) by providing assistance and support to client departments in developing User Asset Management Plans. The 2008/09 financial year will see the continuation of this work and the development of Custodian Asset Management Plan. The Department has developed a turnaround strategy in order to consolidate its initiatives on properties and further developed a comprehensive provincial property management strategy. In an effort to improve infrastructure delivery in the Province, the Department is continuing to implement the Infrastructure Improvement Delivery Programme (IDIP) albeit on a small scale owing to the challenges faced by the departments of Health and Education.

#### 3. Outlook for the coming financial year (2008/09)

The 2008/09 financial year represents continuity and change. Continuity in the sense that the department will continue to implement most of the programmes and projects initiated in 2007 MTEF. Change in the sense that the commitment, zeal, and attitude that saw us succeed in many areas in 2007 financial year, necessitates that we change and do things differently in order to sustain the momentum to succeed, and further introduce new projects. The following programmes and projects are therefore lined up for the 2008/09 financial year.

- Full functionality of the PPP in the development of Bhisho Office Complex 39 000m2 and Mt Ayliff Office Complex (21 000m2)
- Increase the EPWP job creation target from 40 000 to 52 000 and training from 35 650 to 390 000. We will also strengthen our coordinating capacity by developing appropriate systems that will ensure greater compliance, participation and reporting.
- We will increase the intake of artisan trainees by registering 300 more artisan trainees in the infrastructure skills development programme.
- Facilitate the increase in intake of the number of emerging contractors registered in higher grades to
- Continue with the construction of the 6 storey Botha Sigcau Office Parking Complex and the renovation of KD Matanzima building in Mthatha.
- Implementation of the incubator programme targeting 10 contractors in each region with bias to women and youth in construction.
- Continue with the implementation of EPWP contractor learnership programme targeting 50 contractor leanerships.
- Roll- out implementation of energy saving programme in all government departments.
- Implement the Audit Intervention Plan to achieve an unqualified audit report.
- Development of Custodian Asset Register based on the User Asset Management Plans developed by client departments
- Strengthen and formalise relations with clients by developing and signing Service Level Agreements with the relevant client departments.
- Develop and implement the Document Management System
- Manage the implementation of the payment of property rates and taxes. This is a new function devolved the by National Department of Public Works to provinces.
- Establish adequate capacity at Public Works through alignment between the Turnaround Strategy with the Organizational Structure, the implementation of the staff attraction and retention strategies and buy-in of provincial infrastructure departments to DORA implementation on capacity issues.

The department receives an increase in its equitable share ollocation over the 2008 MTEF. From the revised estimates of 2007/08 to 2008/09 medium term estimates the department's budget increase by 55.02 per cent. The Departmental receipts have been adjusted to provide for the delays in the disposal of redundant properties. Revenue projections have been affected by policy shifts regarding the disposal of surplus properties.

#### 5. Payment summary

### **5.1** Key assumptions

In drafting the budget the department has taken into consideration the inflation projections. The 2008/09 budget has taken into account the 1.5 per cent adjustment towards the improvement of staff conditions of service (ICS). The employee liabilities that were quantified in September 2007 towards HROPT cases was R26million and is considered as once-off payment to be implemented in the beginning of the 2008/09 financial year. Salary increases of 6.0 per cent in 2008/09, 5.0 per cent in 2009/10 and 5.0 per cent in 2010/11, effective 1 July 2008. The provision for the carry-through costs of these increases has been accommodated, including the 7.5 per cent increase for 2007/08.

Table 5.1 above shows an increase in the budget of the Programme 2; Public Works for the overall 2008 MTEF period, due to the upgrading of Property Management and the acceleration of implementation of infrastructure projects. The backlog of infrastructure projects (Building Maintenance) has led to the increase of programme 2 budget allocation to cover the demands of maintaining Government buildings. For 2008/09, the department receives R10,000 million and R10,450 million in 2009/10 for the upgrading of the provincial legislature. For the 2008 MTEF the department further receives R62,741 million for the contruction of the Bhisho Office Complex and the implementation of the training and development programme for the artisans.

Table 5.2 shows an increase of 26 per cent with regard to the compensation of employees from R242,014 million in 2007/08 to R305,418 million in 2008/09. The increase accommodates a 1,5 per cent adjustment for the ICS, and further enable the department to effect its recruitment drive for new employees and address the HROPT for the 2nd and 3rd notches. The department further receives R119,638 million in 2008/09; R134,061 million in 2009/10 and R147,467 million in 2010/11 for the devolution of property rates and taxes.

**Purpose**: The Public Works branch is mandated to develop, maintain and manage provincial government buildings through its three main sections, New Works, Maintenance, Property Management and Security Administration. These sections act as implementing agents for development, maintenance and management of old and new buildings for all government departments.

The Sub-programme 2.1, Office Support (New Works): provide support to both property development and major building maintenance work on behalf of client departments.

The Sub-programme 2.2, Property Management: exercise custodian reponsibilities in order to provide accommodation needs of the provincial government departments in the most economic, efficient and effective maner.

The Sub-programme 2.3, Building Maintenance: provide maintenance on provincial government buildings in the Province in order to improve the buildings lifespan and provide a safe working environment.

- Government-wide Immovable Asset Management Framework

- Norms and standards for Government Accommodation

#### Changes: Policy, structure, service establishment, etc. Geographic distribution of services:

In fulfilling our responsibility of providing long term strategic accommodation, a Public Private Partnership has been registered with Treasury for the development of Bhisho Office Park. The Bhisho Office Park is one of the projects in a programme to develop Bhisho and King Williams' Town within a context of King Williams Town/Bhisho revitalisation programme.

An application for registering another PPP for the development of offices in Mt Ayliff has been approved by cabinet. In collaboration with Umzimvubu municipality a suitable site has been identified within the context of Spatial Development Framework. With regard to the Immovable Asset Management, asset register and maintenance plan for 1134 properties have been finalised and being maintained.
