1. Overview

1.1 Vision

A sustainable agricultural sector, integrated rural development and food security for all.

1.2 Mission

To improve agricultural production to stimulate economic development, food security and integrated rural development through:

- Integrated rural development;
- Agrarian reform;
- Sustainable livelihoods;
- Support land reform for agricultural production;
- Facilitating partnerships to commercialise and transformation of the agriculture sector;
- Innovation, research, technology development to increase productivity and competitiveness; and
- Access to opportunities for youth, women and other vulnerable groups

1.3 Core functions and responsibilities

The core functions of the department are derived from its support and promotion of Agriculture and Rural Development in the province. These functions include the following:

- Facilitation and coordination of Rural Development interventions in order to improve rural livelihoods;
- Facilitation, planning and promotion of the Rural Development Strategy in order to ensure that the vision, mission and the pillars of the strategy are achieved;
- Agrarian Transformation and Food Security, supported by effective training, skills development and extension services;
- Provide and support the development of infrastructure to achieve sustainable agriculture;
- Invest in High Impact Projects which add value in agriculture as a business; and
- Ensure that agricultural production is supported by the latest technology development and research.

1.4 Main Services

The main services of the department are as follows:

- Support and promote enterprise development in rural areas using Eastern Cape Rural Development Agency (ECRDA) as the implementing agent for High Impact Projects (HIPS) which provide high returns on investment;
- Facilitate Rural Development which is planning and alignment of rural development activities, promotion of social facilitation, initiating capacity building programmes, support of rural business and non-farm rural activities, increased rural participation and social mobilisation and attracting rural investments and partnerships, referrals, monitoring, evaluation and reporting;
- Create short term jobs (agricultural infrastructure) through the Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP) Integrated Grant for Provinces and the Comprehensive Agricultural Support Programme (CASP) conditional grant;
- Increase crop production and improve production;
- Apply technologically advanced diagnostic procedures for diagnosis and research on animal diseases of economic importance to the province and zoonotic diseases that may pose a risk to human health;
- Support human capital development initiatives in order to boost skills in the agricultural sector in the province through the implementation of the Agriculture Education and Training Sector Strategy;
- Expand on the research support to commercial and emerging farmers to boost productivity and enhance access to marketing services; and,
- Provide agricultural training to commercial farmers, emerging farmers, agricultural students and people residing in rural areas.

1.5 Demands for and expected changes in the services

The province continues with its focus of being the primary producer of agricultural products in order to make the province of the Eastern Cape a food basket of the country given its agricultural potential. Therefore, the implementation of the Agricultural Economic Transformation Strategy (AET) strategy remains critical in assisting the provincial farmers to operate and trade at a commercial level, and thus improve the agricultural contribution to the regional Gross Domestic Product (GDP) as well as food security. The department remains steadfast in its responsibility to improve livelihoods for rural communities, thus creating wealth as well as access to food and nutrition. This will be done amongst others, through improved farmer development to realise increased agricultural production and sector growth. Support to smallholder farmers and work with the private sector within the agricultural sector and other stakeholders is critical for financial access, skills, market access etc. Furthermore, RED hubs/ Agri-parks are also targeted for improved and increased production of white maize and agro-processing to create enough feedstock and diversify products to include livestock feed.

1.6 The Acts, rules and regulations

The key mandate of the department is derived from Schedules 4 and Section 25 of the Constitution. There are a number of Acts that have been promulgated to further support the department's constitutional mandate. Agricultural Development Act (of 1999); Implementation of Conservation of Agricultural Resources Act (of 1983); Eastern Cape Rural Finance Corporation Act (of 1999); Animal Health Act (of 2002); and Meat Safety Act (of 2001). Other constitutional issues affecting rural development include the allocation of powers and responsibilities to national departments and provincial governments to administer land and promote and/or support agrarian reform.

1.7 Budget decisions

DRDAR received an additional funding to cover 2021/22 wage agreement for the cash gratuity in 2022/23. Mitigating this is the equitable share baseline reduction based on new data updates in the PES formula. Furthermore, DRDAR received an additional allocation of R3 million to improve the genetic quality of livestock within the O.R Tambo district to increase amongst other things, the competitive edge of the producers. Also an amount of R5.2 million allocation to implement additional spring protection projects.

DRDAR reprioritised its 2022/23 budget to cater for the department's contractual obligations such as fleet services, computer services, property payments, operating leases and staff exit cost, as these were affected by the baseline reductions effected during the 2021/22 MTEF. Furthermore a provision was made for the 2021/22 carry over posts.

1.8 Aligning departmental budgets to achieve government's prescribed outcomes

the Department has considered National Development Plan (NDP) Vision 2030 and PDP Vision 2030 as overarching policy of making rural areas spatially, socially and economically well integrated across municipal, district and regional boundaries – where residents have economic growth, food security and jobs and as a result agrarian transformation and infrastructure development programmes, and have improved access to basic services, health care and quality education. By 2030 agriculture is expected to create close to 1 million jobs in the country contributing significantly to reducing overall unemployment.

In line with the NDP, the provincial development plan (PDP) has developed five goals to guide its implementation of the NDP; Innovative, inclusive and growing economy; An enabling infrastructure network; An innovative and high-value agriculture and rural sector; Human development; Environmental sustainability; and Capable democratic Institutions

These goals will be pursued with the focus on the rural development with specific emphasis in Ilima Labantu as an agricultural development initiative that aims to revive rural economy and encourage other areas of development in the province.

The department's strategic focus in the next five years in support of the government's seven priorities are:

- Increasing efficiencies and effectiveness of agricultural production and marketing.
- Intensification of agricultural commercialisation.
- Development of norms and standards on provision of agricultural infrastructure
- Exploiting development opportunities to increase entire value chain economic activities.
- Development of a Funding Model to enhance primary production by establishing a commercial agriculture and innovation Fund in partnership with the Land Bank and other commercial financial institutions.
- Identification of the niche market in government Nutrition Programme whereby farmers will find a space to consistently supply good quality produce at the right time.
- Participate fully in the one-plan District Development Model using the OR Tambo District as the model in the Province.

The department has further taken into consideration the impact of COVID 19 on its budget envelope.

2. Review of the current financial year (2021/22)

2.1 Key achievements

In 2021/22 the department continued with the implementation of Agriculture Economic Transformation Strategy which includes strategic partners such with Whiphold, Dalasile Agri-park, Ukhanyo farmer development, as well as South African Grain Association (SAGRA). Therefore 22 271 ha with an average yield of 4 ton/ha against a target of 20 986 were planted. The over performance is mainly attributed to the early rains that enabled mechanisation and planting to be undertaken and 12 569 smallholder producers were supported with production inputs, chemicals and mechanisation services, against a target of 14 008.

Furthermore, to ensure food secure households and provide an opportunity for households to grow their own balanced nutritional food. 13 102 households were supported with food packs (vegetable seeds and seedlings, fertiliser, poultry and piggery including feeds and medicines), against a target of 20 000 households, mainly due to slow delivery by service providers.

One of the key focus areas for the department is the revitalisation of the two tea estates through the Eastern Cape Rural Development Agency (ECRDA), therefore, emphasis was on transforming the tea operations by introducing mechanisation and modern ways of harvesting and processing tea. The Magwa and Majola Tea Estates started harvesting and processing tea in December 2021, as such a total of 175 344 kilograms of green leaf was harvested and 37 536 kilograms of tea was processed. Furthermore, management of Magwa Enterprise Tea and Spar Eastern Cape met in Port Elizabeth and agreed in principle to stock Magwa tea products.

The department through ECRDA continued to provide support to 5 RED hubs i.e., Mbizana, Mqanduli, Emalahleni Ncora and Tshabo Flora RED hubs with but not limited to a solar powered drip irrigation system. Further, facilitation of engagements of a private sector players to buy the Super Maize Meal products from the RED Hubs. These RED hubs have continued to maintain the permanent and casual labourers in their operations.

The department continued to support livestock enterprises in support of sustainable Agriculture Value chains targeting 632 livestock enterprises, and as at end December 2021, 136 enterprises were supported. the Livestock Improvement Production Scheme (LIPS) supported 124 enterprises with superior genetic cattle, sheep and goats. In addition, 5 custom feeding centres were supported in Amatole, Joe Gqabi and Chris Hani with 6 920 bags of ruminant feed for fattening cattle. Furthermore, the Kaonafatso ya Dikgomo (KyD) Scheme in partnership with the Agricultural Research Centre (ARC) continued with the KyD project, and through this collaboration 453 farmers were registered in the system. The purpose of this partnership is to established to realise sustainable livestock improvement by keeping accurate animal performance records facilitating access of smallholder farmers in mainstream agricultural economy.

To maintain a healthy livestock in the Eastern Cape, the department continued assisting farmers with veterinary support through deploying resources including expertise to apply a variety of animal treatments. As at end December 2021, 1 373 million animals were vaccinated against an annual target of 1 355 million, to control animal diseases occurrences and 12 356 epidemiological units were visited against an annual target of 11 711. In addition, 2 259 million treatments were applied to animals for external parasites control against an annual target of 3 943 million. The, routine vaccination of cattle against anthrax and black quarter was administered. To this end 6 957 million treatments were administered to control sheep scab against an annual target of 8 035 million.

Furthermore, 42 266 samples were collected for targeted animal disease surveillance against an annual target of 83 143, animal exports and products is one of the measures of economic activity in the agricultural sector, to this end 3 671 veterinary certificates were issued to clients against an annual target of 4 464.

Infrastructure development remains a key driver for progress and a critical enabler for agricultural productivity and sustainable economic growth. As at end December 2021, the department completed 67 agricultural infrastructure projects such as dipping tanks, multipurpose sheds, animal handling facilities Joe Gqabi, boreholes, and irrigation systems across the province, and DRDAR had a target of 221. The completed infrastructure projects supported 1 606 producers against an annual target of 4 868 on various commodities such as Grain, Red meat and Citrus and other provincial priority commodities.

In line with stimulating rural economic growth the department piloted the Rural Market Centres (RMCs) as a platforms meant to enable rural communities to trade among themselves and create conducive means to minimise marketing constrains experienced by rural communities. The department targeted to pilot 3 RMCs at Amathole, Chris Hani and OR Tambo district. A feasibility report has been developed and presented to the stakeholders of O.R Tambo district, and for Amatole a contract has been awarded.

To promote sustainable resource use, the department facilitated 11 against 30 awareness events targeted for the period under review. The implementation of 17 community Land Care projects benefitted 650 persons, creating 236 green jobs. The regulatory compliance to sustainable land use resulted to 784 ha against a target of 1 225 being assessed in terms of retaining prime agricultural land during rezoning applications.

In order to provide cutting-edge research and technology development, scientists and technicians participated in various congresses organised by the scientific community in the country. The participation of University of Fort Hare in the platform for peer review of their academic research projects continues to grow and strengthen the relationship between these two institutions. A total of 2 808 samples (soils, plants, feed and water) were analysed to support decision making of clients, against an annual target of 3 200 samples.

During the period under review, 1 749 participants were trained in skills development programmes of the sector and the department is targeting to train 2 000 participants by year end. In order to attract new entrants to the sectors 293 school going learners were exposed to various fields in the agriculture and rural development sector, against a target of 200 new entrance. In addition, 20 educators were capacitated in agricultural science related fields to improve their understanding of the sector needs whilst 90 Farm-Workers completed accredited and/or non-accredited training to develop skilled Farm-Workers.

2.2 Key challenges

Heavy rains towards the end of the third quarter affected implementation and completion of some infrastructure projects. Furthermore, factors such as availability of budget within the constrained fiscus impact on various projects/programmes to develop, operate and maintain commercial business. There is also lack of financial support to small financial institutions or markets owing to the lack of track records, and limited agro entrepreneurial skilling and development, further contribute to the below average performance of the sector.

Considering the above mentioned challenges, shrinking budget allocation and challenges with the procurement processes with regards to agricultural business opportunities, the department is of the view that farmers should take lead in conducting farming and their business.

3. Outlook for the coming financial year (2022/23)

In 2022/23, the department will continue to focus on the commercialisation of agriculture value chains to industrialize and transform the agriculture sector through infrastructure development to enable economic growth, Land Care and Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP), extension and advisory services, research, entrepreneurship development support, and skills development, as well as rural development.

The department has identified district based production corridors that takes advantage of natural resource potential of each district municipality in the province. Priority commodities of the province are grain, red meat, citrus; vegetable and lucerne in irrigated areas; wool and mohair; deciduous fruit; dairy; and poultry. A total of 28 529 ha will be planted with field crops, 370 Livestock enterprises supported in support of sustainable agriculture value chains and 22 620 subsistence producers supported. Furthermore, 8 547 smallholder producers will be supported.

The province has developed an activity plan with 13 key focus areas that are aligned to the National Cannabis Masterplan (NCM). Two cannabis incubators will be established in OR Tambo (Magwa Tea Estate) and Amathole (Dohne ADI). These incubators will focus in medical and industrial cultivation, extraction, processing with aggregation points for land race cannabis. Furthermore, incubators will drive research and technology development of Cannabis in the province. These incubators will focus in medical and industrial cultivation, extraction, processing with aggregation points for land race cannabis.

Veterinary services seek to provide veterinary interventions to clients in order to ensure healthy productive animals, safe animal products and welfare of animals and the public. These actions are thereby contributing to a sustainable agricultural sector that drives food (protein) security, agro processing (certified skins and hides from abattoirs and milk from zoonotic disease free herds), facilitating exports of animals and products of animal origin; which in turn contributes to industrialisation, rural development and wealth creation. A total of 1 332 138 animals will be vaccinated against controlled diseases, 7 888 041 treatments will applied to sheep for the control of sheep scab, 3 928 067 treatments will be applied to animals for external parasites control. Furthermore, 69 357 samples will be collected for targeted animal disease surveillance and 11 493 visits conducted to epidemiological units for veterinary interventions. Furthermore, to promote safety of meat and meat products 916 inspections will be conducted on meat processing facilities and 93 abattoirs registered and monitored for compliance, and 4 564 certificates to be issued for export facilitation.

. The strategic retention of high potential agricultural land for the production of food and agro-industry value chain products is guided through recommendations made for local and regional land use developments targeting more than 380 ha cultivated land under conservation agriculture practises. Farmers and rural communities, including youth will be empowered in the oversight, understanding and practice of conservation agriculture through 11 awareness and 15 capacitation activities planned for 2022/23 financial year. The practice of conservation agriculture targets 719 persons to be practicing in sustainable production technologies. The total area of land that will be rehabilitated will be 5 950 ha and 573 green jobs created. A total of 100 early warning as well as structured monitoring and reporting will be carried out through an early warning system.

A total of 335 agricultural infrastructure will be completed towards increasing production in the priority commodities identified through Agriculture Agro-processing Master Plan (AAMP). This will result in 825 jobs created through infrastructure projects in support of sustainable agricultural development. In addition, the department will strengthen the provincial yellow fleet by acquiring the borehole drilling equipment to support farmers during drought periods.

To ensure sustainable growth of the sector, smallholder and subsistence producers will be provided with latest and up-to-date production technology and skills through various methods information dissemination platforms and as such 20 632 agricultural demonstrations will be conducted to practically educate producers on production methods.

Research remains critical for the department for evidence based planning and decision making backstopped by reliable and valid data generation and management. Through the generation and adaption of technologies, research will impact on the increase and the development of especially emerging and new entrance commercial farmers and industrialists related to various commodities and value chains. In addition, technology dissemination and adaption will increase productivity, ensuring that the quality and quantity of products will improve the livelihoods, income and socio economic status of the rural communities

Agri-businesses continues to be critical in growing sustainable agricultural value chains, therefore the department will continue to support these business thus ensuring full participation in the economy. A total of 921 Agri-Businesses with marketing services and 930 clients supported with production economic services. To further enable our producers to penetrate the mainstream economy and markets a total of 9 SA GAP certificates will be facilitated, 14 agribusiness will be supported with Black Economic Empowerment advisory services and 10 Agri-businesses supported with agro-processing initiatives.

Through capacitation interventions, all participants of the sector have the potential of contributing to agricultural production that can lead to self-sustainability in so far as food security is concerned. In the process, building up and acquiring skills. The department seeks to address skills shortage by training a total of 2 000 participants on both crop and livestock, 250 farm workers and 170 out of school youth. Further, 120 unemployed graduates will be placed at agri-businesses and commercial farms for a period of two years to acquire agri-entrepreneurial skills. And total of 600 students are targeted to be enrolled to complete accredited Higher Education and Training qualifications and 155 planned to graduate.

The department is mandated to facilitate and coordinate rural development in the province through integrated planning methodologies. The process is characterised by facilitating activities towards achieving these priorities through Departmental Intergovernmental Relations (IGR) and support the rollout and implementation of the District Development Plan (DDM) as part of Provincial Service Delivery Model. The comprehensive rural development plan through one plan, one district model will ensure coordinated, integrated and cohesive provincial development to enable economic growth and spatial transformation. To realise the objectives of the programme, 6 District Planning Models will be supported, and 6 basic infrastructure projects are planned. Furthermore, 106 rural enterprises will be supported and a total of 4 IGR sessions conducted. ECRDA will continue playing its role as our implementing Agency mainly focusing on high impact projects.

4. Reprioritization

DRDAR undertook an extensive reprioritization from Compensation of Employees (CoE), Transfers and Subsidies as well as Payments for Capital Assets redirecting funding towards mechanisation services (cropping programme) as it is targeting to increase mechanization support to farmers. Also, reprioritization was undertaken to fund the operating expenditure for the Extension Recovery Plan (ERP) pillar, as Department of Agriculture Land Reform, Rural Development gave provinces instruction to use ERP budget mainly for recruitment and training. Furthermore, DRDAR catered for under-budgeted contractual obligations such as fleet services, legal costs, computer services, operating leases and staff exit costs, as these were affected by the baseline reductions. The department continued to protect its service delivery programme in order to deliver on its mandate.

5. Procurement

In 2021/22 the department introduced framework agreements to procure agricultural production inputs, household vegetable inputs and seedlings for a period not exceeding 36 months. Also, an expression of interest to invite service providers to enter into framework agreements/ term contracts to procure was issued. The department will continue to source quotations when needed, thereby reducing the time it takes to procure through advertisement for each commodity. The department will continue to use limited bidding for professional service providers who are already in the database of the department (hydrogeologist, environmental impact assessors), as well as mechanisation service providers who have displayed good performance in the previous season.

An expression of interest will be issued annually for other services providers who are not in the database and are interested to render these services for them to apply for inclusion in the database.

Open competitive bidding will continue for all support services such as security services, communication and computer services. Transversal contracts will be used for veterinary medicine, courier services, mobile services as well as photocopier services. The department will continue to support Local Economic Development (LED) through its procurement processes.

Table 2 indicates source of funding from 2018/19 to 2024/25. The department receives a provincial allocation in the form of an equitable share, and national conditional grant allocation in respect of CASP, Land Care Programme Grant and EPWP incentive Grant for Provinces. Total receipts decreased from R2.305 billion in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R2.260 billion in 2021/22, mainly due to government fiscal consolidation. In 2022/23, the receipts increases by 3.0 per cent in 2022/23 owing to additional funding to cover the 2021/22 wage agreement for the cash gratuity in 2022/23. The budget moderately increases over the 2 outer years, due to updates in the PES formula.

Table 3 above shows the summary of department receipts from 2018/19 to 2024/25. The department's primary source of own receipts is the sale of goods and services, mainly relating to the sale of livestock, agricultural products and veterinarian services.

Own receipts reflect a fluctuating trend, thus declining from R12.460 million to a revised estimate of R8.394 million in 2021/22, mainly due to expenditure recovery and surrenders from the ECRDA. These further decline to R7.962 million in 2022/23 due to higher than anticipated revenue collection in respect of commission insurance and veterinary services as well as expenditure recoveries in 2021/22.

7. Payment summary

7.1 Key assumptions

The department applied the following broad assumptions when compiling the budget:

- All inflation related increases are based on CPI projections as provided in the National Treasury guidelines (2022 MTEF 4.2 per cent in 2022/23, 4.3 per cent in 2023/24 and 4.5 per cent in 2024/25 (based on the 2021 MTBPS)).
- Department will over the 2022 MTEF continue to ensure that allocation of budgets to SCOAs line items continue to reflect the application of the cost containment measures as issued by the National Treasury as per Instructions 2, 3 and 4 of 2017/18 and Provincial Treasury Instruction Note 4 of 2017/18, where spending on non-essential items must be kept at bare minimum or decreasing.
- Regarding CoE budget the department has made provision for the filling of all PCMT approved posts within the existing baseline. On the other hand, the department received additional allocation for the 2021/22 wage agreement for the cash gratuity;
- The department will continue to implement the AET strategy through Goods and Services in line with National Treasury Circular 21.

Tables 4 and 5 above show the summary of payments and budget estimates per programme and economic classification from 2018/19 to 2024/25. Total expenditure declines from R2.305 billion in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R2.260 billion in 2021/22 due to once-off allocations such as implementation of AET strategy and Covid 19 response through crop production and poultry production as well as reductions to cater for fiscal consolidation to fund Health and Education. In addition, compensation of employees baseline reductions was implemented as a provincial reprioritisation to assist adversely affected sectors such as Health and Education in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2022/23, the budget increases by 3.0 per cent to R2.328 billion due to additional allocation to cover wage agreement costs, to augment the livestock genetic improvement programme around the O.R Tambo district, and implement additional spring water projects. The baseline increases moderately over the 2 outer years of the MTEF.

Compensation of Employees increased from R1.218 billion in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R1.248 billion in 2021/22. The increase was mainly to cater for the filling of critical posts. In 2022/23, the budget is estimated to grow by 11.8 per cent to R1.395 billion, mainly attributed to additional allocation wage increment as per the wage agreement .

Goods and Services decreased from R492.293 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R478.867 million in 2021/22, mainly due to once-off allocation for the implementation of AET strategy for the 2017 MTEF,

further once-off allocation in response to the Covid 19 pandemic, i.e. enhancement of food security through increased hectares for crop production and poultry production, as well as fiscal consolidation to fund Health and Education cost pressures imposed by Covid 19 pandemic. In 2022/23, the budget increases by 6.8 per cent to R511.604 million, largely due to a decision to increase mechanisation support to farmers, as well as reprioritisation undertaken to restore budget baselines for contractual obligations owing to baseline reductions implemented during the 2020/21 financial year. Furthermore, the increase is due to an additional funding for spring-water protection programme and the livestock genetic improvement, as well as reprioritisation of funds to cater for contractual obligations.

Transfers and Subsidies decreases from R393.856 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R320.815 million in 2021/22, mainly attributed to compliance with Circular 21, resulting reallocation of the budget for commodity partners to Goods and Services, as well as baseline reductions. There is a significant decline of 19.7 per cent to R257.684 million in 2022/23, due to a decision to provide certain services previously implemented by ECRDA such as mechanisation centres, yellow fleet, and TAS. The budget moderately increases over the 2 outer years.

Payments for Capital Assets increased from R191.575 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R212.954 million in 2021/22, largely ascribed to government fiscal consolidation and government's policy to curtail the public sector wage bill or the wage freeze. In 2022/23, the decline by 23.2 per cent to R163.564 million is mainly due to reprioritisation aimed at redirecting funding towards mechanisation services (cropping programme), thus targeting to increase mechanization support to farmers. It moderately increases over the 2 outer years.

Table 6 above depicts the summary of departmental payments and budget estimates by benefiting municipal boundary from 2018/19 to 2024/25. Total expenditure decreased from R2.305 billion in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R2.260 billion in 2021/22 mainly to once-off allocations such as implementation of AET strategy and Covid 19 response through crop production and poultry production as well as reductions to cater for fiscal consolidation to fund Health and Education; CoE baseline reductions was implemented as a provincial reprioritisation to assist adversely affected sectors such as Health and Education in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2022/23, the budget increases by 3 per cent to R2.328 billion due to additional funding to cover the 2021/22 wage agreement for cash gratuity. The baseline increases moderately over the 2 outer years of the MTEF due to updates in the Provincial Equitable Share (PES).

Table 7 summarises the infrastructure expenditure and estimates relating to the department from 2018/19 to 2024/25. Infrastructure expenditure slightly increased from R159.012 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R160.560 million in 2021/22. This project includes irrigation equipment, production inputs and training of farmers. mainly due to the finalise the support for the Amajingqi Macademia Nut orchard establishment project. In 2022/23 the budget decreases by 17.4 per cent million to R132.605 million due to reprioritization aimed at redirecting funds towards mechanisation services for cropping programme as DRDAR is targeting to increase mechanization support to farmers. Over the MTEF the budget for infrastructure fluctuates due to prioritization of projects and having to finalise planning for irrigation, piggery, poultry and other projects the actual construction can start.

The MTEF budget provides for support of infrastructure projects for farmers such as renovations of dip tanks, renovations and new multi-purposes shearing shed, renovation of irrigation systems and fencing.

Table 11 above shows the summary of transfers to other entities from 2018/19 to 2024/25. Tables 12 and 13 above show the expenditure and estimates for Administration per sub-programme and economic classification from 2018/19 to 2024/25. Expenditure for the programme decreased from R474.156 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R432.681 million in 2021/22, mainly due to baseline reductions resulted from reprioritisation to fund cost pressures in the service delivery programmes. In 2022/23, the budget increases by 5.3 per cent to R455.569 million due to additional allocation to cater for wage increase as per the wage agreement. Furthermore, it relates to the reprioritisation done to fund contractual obligations such as building leases, operating leases, security services, audit fees, that were adversely affected by the 2021 MTEF baseline reductions. Also, provision made for staff exit costs caused by high staff turnover contributed to the increase.

Compensation of Employees increased from R311.464 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R311.561 million in 2021/22. The budget in 2022/23 increases by 8.6 per cent to R338.200 million mainly due to additional allocation to cater for the wage agreement, and to cover costs of carry over posts as the department could not fully process all 346 post planned for the 2021/22 financial year.

Goods and Services decreased from R114.770 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R90.976 million in 2021/22 due to implementation baseline reductions. In 2022/23 the budget increases by 5.2 per cent to R95.679 million, mainly to offset shortfalls resulting from baseline reductions implemented during the 2021/22 financial year with carry-through effects on items such as for fleet services, legal costs, computer services and operating leases.

Transfers and Subsidies increase from R18.250 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R20.602 million in 2021/22, relating to staff exit costs or leave gratuities. In 2022/23, it decreases by 27.2 per cent to R15 million, due to provision made to defray anticipated shortfall on leave gratuity, and to fund court order settlements.

Payments for Capital Assets decreases from R20.311 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R9.483 million in 2021/22 mainly due to baseline reductions. In 2022/23, the budget decreases by 29.5 per cent to R6.690 million mainly due to the carry-through effect of baseline reductions as well as the reprioritisation of funds undertaken to fund shortfall relating to contractual obligations.

Programme 2: Sustainable Resource Use and Management

Objectives: To provide agricultural support services to farmers in order to ensure sustainable development and management of agricultural resources. It has 4 sub-programmes:

- **Agricultural Engineering Services:** Provides engineering support (planning, development, monitoring and evaluation) with regards to irrigation technology, on-farm mechanization, value adding, farm structures, resource conservation management, operation and maintenance of farm equipment and machinery, tools and implements solutions;
- **Land Care:** Promotes the sustainable use and management of natural agricultural resources;
- **Land Use Management:** To promote the implementation of sustainable use and management of natural agricultural resources through regulated Land Use (Act 43 of 1983, Act 70 of 1970, and related legislation); and
- **Disaster Risk Reduction:** To provide agricultural disaster risk management support services to clients / farmers.

Tables 14 and 15 above show the summary of payments and estimates for Sustainable Resource Use and Management per sub-programme and economic classification from 2018/19 to 2024/25. Expenditure of the programme decreased from R148.500 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R128.209 million in 2021/22 due to once off allocation for drought relief interventions (CASP and ILIMA) to support farmers with fodder around the Sarah Baartman area, and to provide support to all districts with training and development capacity. It is also due to the reprioritisation of the budget for Compensation of employees to fund spending pressures in respect of the cropping programme in Agricultural Producer Support programme. The budget for 2022/23 increases by 7.7 per cent to R138.047 million to cover for the wage agreement costs, and cater for the carry over posts. There is a steady growth over the two outer years.

Compensation of Employees decreased from R93.642 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R91.804 million in 2021/22 attributed to the filling of critical posts. In 2022/23, it increases by 15.2 per cent to R105.750 million mainly to cover for the wage agreement costs, and for the carry over posts from 2021/22.

Goods and Services decreased from R46.456 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R22.643 million in 2021/22, due to a once-off 2018/19 Adjustment Estimate allocation for drought relief interventions under the Land Care Programme, as well as government fiscal consolidation and government's policy to curtail the public sector wage bill. In 2022/23 the budget increases to R23.288 million or 2.8 per cent to mainly to fund cost pressures such as travel and subsistence, training for engineers on professional development and software used by engineers especially for the newly appointed .

Transfers and Subsidies increased from R2.301 million in 2020/21 to R7.641 million in 2021/22, mainly attributed to payment of casual labourers. It is also due to court order settlement on staff matters. In 2022/23, the budget decreases by 51.9 per cent to R3.676 million as the court order settlement was once-off.

Payments for Capital Assets decreased from R8.402 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R6.121 million in 2021/22 mainly due to funds rolled over during 2019/20 to Land Care for drought relief for scooping of dams and boreholes, as well as baseline reductions. In 2022/23, the budget decreases by

12.9 per cent to R5.333 million mainly due to the planned purchase of conservation agriculture planters and bailers and tractor's to be used in conservation agriculture, as well as departmental vehicles (leases).

- **Food Security:** To support, advise and coordinate the implementation of pillar one of the Integrated Food Security Strategy of South Africa (IFSS).

Tables 17 and 18 above show the summary of departmental payments and estimates for the Farmer Support and Development programme per sub-programme and economic classification from 2018/19 to 2024/25. Expenditure increased from R793.762 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R834.538 million in 2021/22, mainly due to additional allocation to enable the department to respond to the COVID -19 pandemic through increased hectares for crop production, poultry production and other household support to enhance food security especially for the rural community. Furthermore, there was additional allocation for drought intervention measures within the agricultural sector the National Disaster Management Center- Department of Cooperative Governance (DCOG) transferred additional funding for. Also, the once-off allocation for stimulus funding on grain industry value chain. In 2022/23, the budget increases by 2.5 per cent to R855.629 million due to additional funding for enhancing the livestock genetic improvement programme around the O.R Tambo district, and for construction of spring water sites in line with Rural Development.

Compensation of Employees increased from R359.057 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R365.434 million in 2021/22, due to reprioritisation made for the filling of critical posts. In 2022/23, budget significantly increases by 19.3 per cent to R436.114 million to cater for the filling of critical carry-over posts that includes Director: Food Security, Deputy Director: Extension and Advisory Services and 10 extension officers, and planned recruitments. It is also due the reclassification of Extension Recovery Plan programme (ERP) budget form Goods and Services as per the directive from the Department of Agriculture Land Reform and Rural Development (DALRRD with regards to the recruitment of qualified extension personnel to accommodate the 1:3:1 ratio i.e. 1 Agricultural Advisor: 3 Senior Agricultural Advisors: 1 Specialist.

Goods and Services increased from R210.020 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R267.162 million in 2021/22 due to additional funding to enable the department to respond to the COVID -19 pandemic. Also, the additional funding for drought intervention measures within the agricultural sector from the National Disaster Management Centre in the Department of Cooperative Governance (DCOG) transferred. In 2022/23, the budget increases by 8.9 per cent to R290.921 million, mainly due to additional funding

allocated to augment the livestock genetic improvement programme around the O.R Tambo district. Furthermore, funds have been to increase the number of hectares targeted for mechanisation support 12 498 ha to 14 996. Furthermore, funds from the Rural Development programme were reclassified to this economic classification as a decision was taken to internally provide support to the mechanisation centres and the RED Hubs, previously assigned to ECRDA, and this was budgeted for under Transfers and Subsidies.

Transfers and Subsidies decreased from R98.600 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R31.510 million in 2021/22, mainly due to reclassification of funds to Goods and Services in line with National Treasury Circular 21. In 2022/23, the budget decreases by 88.9 per cent to R3.509 million due to a decision to provide an in-house support to mechanisation centres as opposed to be done by the ECRDA.

Payments for Capital Assets increased from R125.997 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R170.434 million in 2021/22 attributed to once-off allocation from the National Disaster Management Centre in DOCG for drought intervention measures within the agricultural sector. In 2022/23, the budget decreases by 26.6 per cent to R125.085 million, mainly due to reprioritisation of funds to Goods and Services for mechanisation services (cropping programme) as the programme is targeting to increase mechanization support to farmers.

This programme will mainly support the AET Strategy which is based on the commodity and cluster models that seeks to enable rural communities. The focus will be increasing grain, horticulture production, and livestock production.

Programme 4: Veterinary Services

Objectives: To provide veterinary services to clients in order to ensure healthy animals, safe animal products and welfare of people of South Africa. The programme has 4 sub-programmes namely:

- **Animal Health:** To facilitate and provide animal disease control services in order to protect the animal and human population against identified infectious, zoonotic and / or economic diseases, through the implementation of the Animal Diseases Act (Act 35 of 1984), and primary animal health programme/projects;
- **Export Control:** To provide control measures including risk assessment and health certification in order to facilitate the exportation of animals and animal products;
- **Veterinary Public Health:** To ensure the safety of meat and meat products through the implementation of the Meat Safety Act (Act 40 of 2000), the Animal Diseases Act (Act 35 of 1984), and other relevant legislation.; and

- Veterinary Laboratory Services:** To render veterinary diagnostic, laboratory and investigative services that will back the control of animal diseases for adherence to hygienic standards and to generate data.

Tables 20 and 21 above show the summary of departmental payments and estimates for Veterinary Services per sub-programme and economic classification from 2018/19 to 2024/25. Expenditure decreased from R316.136 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R295.141 million in 2021/22, mainly due to baseline reductions, as well as a decision taken by the department to defer support aimed at supporting the establishment of the Veterinary school at Fort Hare University, as the Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET) that was championing the establishment of Vet school, was severely affected by the Covid 19 pandemic, thus changing its focus. In 2022/23, the budget increases by 6 per cent to R312.872 million to cater for the procurement of medical supplies and medicines, as well as to cover the wage agreement costs. The budget and grows moderately over the outer years.

Compensation of Employees increased from R241.223 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R245.234 million in 2021/22 to for the filling of critical posts. In 2022/23, the budget grows by 7 per cent to R262.303 million mainly due to additional funding to cover the wage agreement costs.

Goods and Services decreased from R65.317 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R44.497 million due to baseline reductions implemented during the 2020/21 financial year. In 2022/23, the budget increases by 2.7 per cent to R45.698 million to cater for the acquisition of veterinary medicines and chemicals and travel costs for animal health technicians.

Transfers and Subsidies shows a transfer payment of R1 million in 2019/20 for the establishment of a Veterinary School at University of Fort Hare, however, the department has deferred support related to the establishment of the Vet school, as the Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET) that was championing the establishment of Vet school, was severely affected by the Covid 19 pandemic changing its focus.

The Payments for Capital Assets decreased from R9.586 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R5.410 million in 2021/22, mainly attributed to baseline reductions during the 2020/21 Adjustment Estimates period, as well shifting of funds to fund pressures related to staff exit costs, shortfall on compensation of employees and fleet services. In 2022/23, the budget decreases by 10 per cent to R4.871 million mainly due to reprioritisation undertaken during 2021/22 Adjustments Estimate period to fund pressures relating to Fort Cox student bursaries.

Tables 23 and 24 above show the summary of departmental payments and estimates for Research and Technology Development Services per sub-programme and economic classification from 2018/19 to 2024/25. Expenditure decreased from R133.530 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R117.957 million in 2021/22 mainly due to government fiscal consolidation, as well as reprioritisation of personnel budget to address spending pressure or shortfall in respect of cropping programme in Programme 3. In 2022/23, the budget increases by 11.9 per cent to R132.028 million due to reprioritisation to fund revitalisation of the research centres in respect of fencing material for camps, repairing of machinery, and procurement of tractors such as Tractor Loader Backhoes (TLBs) and Graders for the research centres. In addition, the programme will procure seeds, fertilizers and animal feed for animals within the research centres in order to improve agricultural production. The budget continues to grow moderately over the 2 outer years.

Compensation of Employees decreased from R108.875 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R104.135 million in 2021/22, mainly due to baseline reductions and shifting of funds during the 2021/22 Adjustment Estimates to defray anticipated shortfalls under Agricultural Producer Support and Development programme. In 2022/23, the budget increases to R115.532 million by 10.9 per cent mainly to cover carry-over posts from 2021/22, such as scientific technicians, animal, artisan – plumbing, control scientific, farm aid and security personnel, as well as cover the wage agreement costs.

Goods and Services decreased from R20.772 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R12.600 million in 2021/22, due to government fiscal consolidation. In 2022/23, the budget increases by 19 per cent to R14.990 million, mainly due to reprioritisation aimed at revitalising the research centres to improve agricultural production.

Transfers and Subsidies shows expenditure of R2.492 million in 2019/20 which relates to court settlement paid to an employee. In 2022/23, there is a provision made for remunerating casual labourers responsible for the fencing of research camps.

Payments for Capital Assets decreased from R3.883 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R1.222 million in 2021/22, due to baseline reductions. In 2022/23, the budget decreases further by 1.3 per cent to R1.206 million due carry through effects of baseline reductions.

Tables 26 and 27 above show the summary of the departmental payments and estimates for Agricultural Economics Services per sub-programme and economic classification from 2018/19 to 2024/25. Total expenditure decreased from R87.931 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R31.881 million in 2021/22, mainly due to reclassification of the funding for Magwa tea estate under Transfers and Subsidies to the Rural Development programme. In 2022/23, the budget increases by 11.5 per cent to R35.555 million, mainly due to the funding for the wage agreement. The budget increases steadily over the 2 outer years.

Compensation of Employees increased moderately from R28.016 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R29.227 million in 2021/22, to cater for planned recruitment. In 2022/23, the budget increases by 15.7 per cent to R33.826 million to fund carry over posts and provision made for the wage agreement.

Goods and Services decreased from R2.867 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R2.130 million in 2021/22 mainly due to the implementation of baseline reductions. In 2022/23, the budget decreases further by 24.4 per cent to R1.610 million due to reprioritisation to fund staff exist costs in the Administration programme.

Transfers and Subsidies decreased from R56.813 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R154 thousand in 2020/21, mainly due to shifting of the Magwa tea estate function to Rural Development and Coordination programme. Expenditure reflected in 2021/22 revised estimates relates to a court settlement paid to an employee and was a once-off hence there is no funding over the MTEF.

Payments for Capital Assets increased from R235 thousand in 2018/19 to revised estimates of R299 thousand in 2021/22 attributed to baseline reductions. In 2022/23, the budget decreases by 60.2 per cent to R119 thousand, attributed to reprioritisation to fund staff exit cost in the Administration programme.

Tables 28 and 29 above show the summary of departmental payments and estimates for Agricultural Education and Training per sub-programme and economic classification from 2018/19 to 2024/25. Expenditure increased from R161.762 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R187.646 million in 2021/22, due to reprioritisation to fund a shortfall in the catering services for students at the Tsolo Agricultural Rural Development Institute (TARDI), court settlement paid to an employee as well as to fund student bursaries at Fort Cox college. In 2022/23, the budget declines by 1.4 per cent to R185.005 million owing to reprioritisation undertaken during the 2021 Adjustment Estimates to fund student bursaries for Fort Cox students, as well as the once off provision to fund court settlement. The budget increase moderately over the 2 outer years. The budget increase moderately over the 2 outer years.

Compensation of Employees increased from R59.575 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R81.894 million in 2021/22, for the filling of critical posts. In 2022/23 the budget increases by 0.6 per cent to R82.370 million.

Goods and Services increased from R22.512 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R22.607 million in 2021/22, due to rolled over funds for project management and the professional services for the construction of outfall sewer and waste water treatment plant at Fort Cox. In 2022/23, the budget increased by 4 per cent to R23.502 million largely ascribed to reprioritisation to fund shortfall on catering services for students at the Tsolo Agricultural Rural Development Institute (TARDI).

Transfers and Subsidies increased from R57.218 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R63.428 million in 2021/22, mainly due to expenditure relating to once-off court settlement paid to an employee, as well as reprioritisation to fund Fort Cox college student bursaries. In 2022/23 budget decrease by 6.9 per cent to R59.051 million mainly due to a once-off reprioritisation undertaken during the 2021/22 Adjustment Estimates to fund student bursaries for Fort Cox students, as well as the once off provision to cater for the court settlement

Payments for Capital Assets decreased from R22.457 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R19.717 million in 2021/22 due to Payment for Capital Assets mainly due to savings realised on infrastructure to fund the Extension Recovery Programme (ERP), as the funding was not in line with the provisions of Department of Agriculture, Foresteries, and Fisheries (DAFF), in the CASP business plan.

In 2022/23, the budget increases by 1.9 per cent to R20.082 million mainly for the revitalization of Agricultural Colleges. The budget increase moderately over the 2 outer years

Tables 32 and 33 above show the summary of the departmental payments and estimates for the Rural Development Co-ordination programme from 2018/19 to 2024/25. In 2018/19, the programme increased

from R189.793 million to a revised estimate of R232.929 million in 2021/22, mainly due to additional allocation to establish the Tshabo RED hub; and the following once-off amounts for the reimbursement of ECRDA in respect of funds transferred to Magwa; to fund salary related cost pressures; to support the development of cannabis industry in the province, as well as funds for Economic Stimulus intended for grain value chain implemented by ECRDA. Furthermore, funds were reprioritised to establish Rural Market centres, and implement additional spring water protection sites. In 2022/23, the budget decreases by 8.3 per cent to R213.496 million, and this is linked to end of additional allocations or once off allocation. In addition, a decision to implement the projects in-house that were previously implemented by ECRDA further contributed to the decline. These include yellow fleet, and TAS. The budget increases moderately over the two outer years.

Compensation of Employees increased from R16.515 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R18.927 million in 2021/22, to fund critical posts. In 2022/23, the budget increases by 12.3 per cent to R21.253 million to fund carry over posts from 2021/22, wage agreement.

Goods and Services increased from R9.579 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R16.252 million in 2021/22 is mainly attributed to reprioritization of funds to support additional sewing projects, and to implement additional spring water protection sites, as well as to establish Rural Market centres. In 2022/23, the budget slightly decreases by 2.1 per cent to R15.196 million, mainly due to reprioritization to fund the cropping programme in order to increase mechanization support to farmers. Whilst the budget reflects a decline, the programme has received a once-off allocation of R5.230 million for the implementation of additional spring protection sites. The decrease in the middle year of the 2022 MTEF relates to the once off allocation in the previous year.

Transfers and Subsidies increased from R162.975 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R197.480 million in 2021/22, mainly due to allocation for the establishment of the Tshabo RED hub; and the once off allocations relating to additional allocation to reimburse ECRDA in respect of funds transferred to Magwa; funds to Magwa tea estate for salary related cost pressures; funds to support the Magwa Business rescue; funds to support the development of cannabis industry in the province, and funds from the Economic Stimulus funds for grain value chain to be implemented by ECRDA . In 2022/23, the budget decreases by 10.8 per cent to R176.148 million, mainly due to once-off, Stimulus Fund for grain value chain as well as the decision to implement some of its projects in-house instead of ECRDA. These include Yellow fleet and Technical Advisory Service (TAS).

Payments for Capital Assets decreased from R724 thousand in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R270 thousand in 2021/22, due to completion of renovation works for the Nomabali Arts Centre in Coffee Bay In 2022/23, the budget decreases by 34.1 per cent to R178, in 2021/22 the department made a provision to procure office furniture, and the process was finalized in 2021/22.

Table 35 above show the summary of personnel numbers and cost per component from 2018/19 to 2024/25. The headcounts decreased from 2 698 in 2018/19 to 2 471 in 2020/21 mainly due to high staff turnover within the department. In 2022/23 the personnel increases to 2 836 or 5.5 per cent. The department reviewed its Organisational Structure supported by Human Resource Plan which is aligned to the AET Strategy. Subsequently, the Provincial Committee Management Team (PCMT) approved critical 346 posts to be filled by the department during the 2021/22 financial year. As at the end of January 132 posts has been filled and the 214 carry-over posts.

The department will continue to train officials in technical, business skills and reporting according to the milestones embedded in each commodity group that has signed Service Level Agreements (SLAs) with the department. This step will ensure that a paradigm is taken to increase the capacity of farmers as well as officials in various aspects of the agriculture sector industry.

The department will continue in prioritising the filling of critical posts that will add value in the implementation of the strategy and continue maintaining the acceptable vacancy rate of 5 per cent.

Table 36 show the departments' information on training from 2018/19 to 2024/25. The training budget increased from R15.108 million in 2018/19 to a revised estimate of R16.838 million in 2021/22. In 2022/23 the budget decreases by 37 per cent to R10.611 million due to effects of the COVID -19 pandemic, that slowed the training and development of officials.

The department is amongst organisations that have created a training and experiential space for youth and unemployed graduates in the past financial years. The intention of the programme is to equip the interns with knowledge, skills, and practical work experience preparing them for the labour market, cooperatives and entrepreneurial space. In 2020/21, the department appointed 151 interns and 33 experiential learners in a professional work setting in fields such as Animal Health, Analytical Chemistry, Plant Pathology, Soil Science, Financial Management, Human Resource Management, Agri-Business, Extension, Crop Production and Animal Production. The Department offered bursary opportunity to 22 students from designated groups in the fields of Veterinary Science and Animal Science. Departmental employment equity targets will be taken into consideration when awarding bursaries. 125 Employees have been offered bursary opportunities to enhance the skills of the departmental human resources.
