# 2. Review of the current financial year (2022/23)

# Performance Highlights for Financial Year 2022/23

- Business Development and Support:
  - A total of 198 supported SMMEs were trained through Ubuntu Pro Solutions.
- Economic Recovery:
  - The Department has finalised eleven (11) sector master plans to guide the development of an Economic reconstruction and recovery plan. The economic recovery plan is intended to provide clear strategy and action plans to grow various sectors of the economy in the province. The focus is going to be on labour-intensive sectors such as agriculture and manufacturing due to their potential to create more jobs.

# • Township and Rural Development Support:

- The Township and Rural Entrepreneurship Programme (TREP) is a dedicated programme to transform and integrate opportunities in townships and rural areas into productive business ventures. The focus is to create platforms that provide the business support infrastructure and regulatory environment that enables entrepreneurs to thrive.
- DESTEA has been assisting SMME's to apply to this national programme.
- Consumer Protection:
  - Inspections were conducted in relation to Competition Commission decisions made on fairness.
  - $\circ$  Collaborated with Cogta on an exercise to review municipal by-laws
  - The department worked with stakeholders i.e. SAPS, Community Leaders, DHA, FS consumers, NCRS etc. on ensuring that consumers are protected against illicit activities and corruption.
  - Consumer awareness and education sessions were conducted on consumers' right to fair and honest dealings.

# • Access to Markets

 Free State enterprises were profiled and access were created to platforms, both in the mainstream and digital media, where our enterprises got to showcase their products.

# • Tourism Development:

- Tourist Guide Lekgotla held on 07 July 2022:
- $\circ~$  The Provincial Tourism Forum held on 15 July 2022:

- Provincial Tourism Career Expo held on 4 5 August 2022 at Central University of Technology (CUT)
- Tourism Educators Development Programme:

Initiated by Department of Tourism, DESTEA and DOE. The training is to enhance the exposure of educators to the tourism industry. Session to accommodate all 4 district including the metro. Sessions are planned to commence from February 2023 as stipulated by DoE.

# • Biodiversity Management:

- Visible policing and regular operations by the Biodiversity Environmental Management Inspector team, in conjunction with the SAPS, has significantly reduced the poaching of protected species in the Province during the period under review.
- The Small Scale Inland Fisheries Project, a project piloted during 2022/2023, has reflected the feasibility of projects of this nature and has proven that they have the potential of making real positive changes to the livelihoods of communities living close to large dams in the province.
- The work done on the national wetland mapping continues and DESTEA has been a major contributor to this project through the development of the technical mapping tools and modalities to guide wetland mapping in other provinces and San Parks.

# • Green Economy:

- A concept document was developed and approved, which precipitated a scoping study, where prospects of using waste as a resource were explored, to that end waste diversion opportunities have been presented to stakeholders within the Industrial Parks.
- Waste Diversion opportunities were presented during the launch of Industrial Symbiosis in the Free State province. Waste generators were identified, with the objective of paring partners that will feed into various production processes. Further, a feasibility study on separation at sources was conducted, the outcome of the study indicated that waste separation at source is feasible in the Free State Province, however, a lot of work needs to be done in terms of continued awareness and education. Piloting of the recommendation of the study was done in two municipalities, namely Mangaung Metropolitan Municipality and Masilonyana Local Municipality.

- **Compensation of Employees**: The allocation is R324.2 million for 2023/24, R331.3 million for 2024/25 and R350.3 million for 2025/26. A decrease of 2.7 percent in the first year of the MTEF.
- **Goods and Services**: The allocation for 2023/24 is R128.6 million and in 2024/25 and 2025/26 stays at R123. 0 million.
- **Transfers and Subsidies**: For 2023/24 an amount of R162.1 million was allocated and R189.8 million in 2024/25 and stays the same for 2025/26. The allocation is mainly transfers to the entities.
- Building and Other Fixed Structures: The department has decided to focus on maintaining the resorts and reserves hence the increase in the budget allocation for maintenance. R10.0 million for 2023/24 – 2025/26 period has been allocated for upgrades and additions.
- **Machinery and Equipment**: The allocation under machinery and Equipment is mainly for the procurement of computers and equipment for resorts and reserves, and for finance leases for photocopier machines.

# 9.2 **Programme expenditure analysis**

## Programme 1:

With the downwards baseline allocation in 2023/24 financial year from R190.6 million to R183.8 million in 2024/25. The department will reprioritize funds and try to cover this shortfall.

The main pressures were Identified under fixed costs like the leasing of Government Vehicles and Microsoft office.

## Programme 2

In 2022/23 an amount of R6.0 million is reprioritized from Goods and Services to fund pressures under Compensation of Employees. This was mainly to cover the 1.5 percent pay progression which has to be funded with the baseline allocation.

In 2024/25 departments were required to increase their Compensation of Employees by 4.45 percent, the department then reprioritized R7.0 million from Goods and Services. This amount is also insufficient to cover the required increase.

## Programme 3:

In 2022/23, the main budget was R229.0 million and was upwardly adjusted to R239.0 million during adjustment process. The increase was on transfers to Free State Gambling Tourism and liquor authority to promote Tourism activities.

## Programme 4:

The main budget under this programme was R10.4 million for 2022/23 and it was increased to R14.6 million during the adjustment budget process. It further went down to R13.8 million in 2023/24 to R18 million budget cut on equitable share.
