## 1. Overview

#### 1.1 Vision

To be a department that strives to ensure progressive realization of universal schooling, improving quality of education and eliminating disparities amongst Free State citizens.

#### 1.2 Mission

# 1.7 Aligning departmental budgets to achieve government's prescribed outcomes

On a national level the Free State Department of Education work is directly aligned to the Outcome 1 "Improved Quality of Basic Education". The department's Annual Performance Plans (APP) outlines the links to NDP and MTSF and national "Action Plan 2019, towards Schooling 2030". The government program of action indicated that since 2011 the budget will be centred on the 12 identified outcomes across the Departments. The Department of Education mainly contributes to outcome 1: "Improve the quality of basic education".

The national state of disaster followed by the nation-wide lockdown has affected departmental plans that were in place by the beginning of 2021. The response of government to COVID-19 brought about changes to the operating environment and these changes have also affected the service delivery environment.

# 2. Review of the current financial year (2022/23)

The following policy priorities and strategies, amongst others, will be supported in 2022/23 financial year to ensure the realization of the Department's vision.

#### **National School Nutrition Programme (NSNP):**

The main purpose of the NSNP Programme is to provide nutritious meals to targeted learners. The Provincial Education Department takes pride in feeding learners in Q1-3 schools as well as identified special schools. This is a great achievement with learners

receiving daily nutritious meals to help them perform better in schools and it is made possible by Districts and schools through the implementation of the National School Nutrition Programme (NSNP).

The budget received for 2022/23 financial year was R488.785 million with adjusted budget of R494.002 million. The objective of the Programme is to enhance learning capacity and improve quality of education and about 597 600 learners benefited in 2022/23 financial year.

The programme engages the services of 3 395 Volunteer Food Handlers (VFHs) who are involved in the preparation and serving of meals to the learners. With funding from Social Sector Grant EPWP 120, NSNP Assistants were appointed to assist NSNP schools administratively.

#### **Learner Transport:**

Learner Transport aims to provides transport to schools for identified and qualifying learners, in line with the Learner Transport Policy. The 2022/23 allocated budget is R102.4 million rand and the target of learners to be transported are 9 933 learners. The province developed an Integrated Rural Education Strategy (IRES) that will streamline the provision of Learner Transport so that the function is more cost effective and addresses cost-benefits.

#### **Examinations:**

The Free State province recorded 88,5% matric pass rate for 2022, an impressive increase from the previous year's 85.7%. Since the advent of the NSC in 2008 the Free State Province has been number 1 for 7 times in the last 10 years and consecutively for the past 4 years.

15,754 learners (43.9%) obtained bachelor's passes in 2022 compared to the 13,971 learners (39.9%) in 2021. In 2021 the number of candidates that qualified for entry to diploma study was 10,836, in 2022 the number increased by 628 to 11,464.

From 2021 to 2022 the quality passes have increased by 2 411 candidates from 24 807 in 2021 to 27 218 in 2022 (74.3%). All our districts have achieved more than 85% in 2022. Commendably, our township schools, on their own outperformed all provinces.

Our star district in 2022 is Motheo District at 90.08% an improvement of 2.18% from 2021. Motheo District also obtained an unprecedented 49.5% bachelor passes. Two Free State Districts reached the top 2 positions nationally, Motheo in the first position and Fezile Dabi District in the second position.

#### **Provision of Learning and Teaching Support Material (LTSM)**

In 2022/23 financial year, grades 1-3, grades 7-9 and grade 12 benefitted. For other grades it was a top-up, and procurement of new textbooks for the new subjects and grades.

Circular 2 of 2022 has been issued out to schools – June (Placement and delivery of Mopup Textbooks for all subjects in all the grades). The system opened for all schools to place their requisition on 06 June 2022 and closed on the 24 June 2022. Preliminary quantities were issued on 5 July 2022. LTA 5 issued to schools on deliveries of textbooks to schools

Approval was granted for 564 552 textbooks for 331 schools for 2023 academic year. The Department procured for section 20 and 21.1c schools, all 331 schools successfully placed orders.

#### **Pre-Grade R Training**

The FSDoE trained 1 000 practitioners on National Curriculum Framework (NCF) during the 2022/23 financial year. Additional 150 practitioners (100 in Thabo Mofutsanyana and 50 in Xhariep District) will be up-skilled towards ECD NQF Level 4 qualification during the 2022/2023 financial year.

- 1 000 practitioners were trained on Toy Libraries to ensure that children learn through play as envisaged by the FSDoE. 200 Centres will be provided with educational toys as part of enhancing learning through play during the 2022/2023 financial year.
- 1 000 Practitioners are trained on the NCF. 2 500 NCF Documents were printed and distributed accordingly. 200 Practitioners are up skilled towards NQF L 4 qualification as follows:
  - Thabo Mofutsanyana: 50; Fezile Dabi: 50; Motheo: 50; Lejweleputswa: 50

The Directorate has planned for the training of Toy Libraries before the end of March 2023. This enables Practitioners to plan for the whole academic year.

#### **Expansion of Grade R**

The Department funded 350 Grade R practitioners for 2022/2023 financial year. The aim was to get the system ready for Universalisation. The number of Grade R leaners will increase by 5 000. It is expected that Grade R will be universalised during this period.

The Department managed to convert 450 ECD practitioners to Post 1 educator who are qualified as educators in the 2022/23 financial year.

The Gr R learners was provided with LTSM and feeding (NSNP). 27 Public schools that did not offer Grade R applied and have been registered in the 2022 academic year.

The Free State Department of Education (FSDoE) funded 266 Grade R practitioners/teachers through ETDP SETA at different Higher Education Institutions, the following institutions gave training:

# Social Sector Expanded Public Works programme Incentive Grant for Provinces

The Department was allocated R7.1 million during the 2022/23 financial year and appointed 116 Teacher Assistants and 120 NSNP Assistants as well as 4 Data Capturers on contract. The monthly stipend was R2.420,00 for all Assistants and R3 300 for Data Capturers. These Assistants was distributed amongst 5 districts (Motheo, Xhariep; Lejweleputswa; Fezile Dabi and Thabo Mofutsanyana).

# ECD migration from Free State Department of Social Development to Department of Education

During State of the Nation Adress (SONA) in February 2019, the President announce that the country would proceed towards two years of compulsory schooling for all children before they enter Grade 1. The FSDoE accepted the ECD functions listed in Chapter 5 (which focuses on partial care) and Chapter 6 of the Children's Act, No.38 of 2005 from the Department of Social Development (DSD) as of 1<sup>st</sup> April 2022 as part of the National strategy towards ensuring that children from birth to 4 years receive quality education in preparation for formal schooling. There is a total number of 1267 ECD sites the FSDoE is providing services to:

• Total number of children in ECD sites in the Province is 72 899

The Department is currently subsidizing 11 128 of these children under conditional grant in 332 ECD sites and 47 552 under Equitable share in 912 ECD sites.

After the Function Shift a Means Test verification exercise was conducted with the ECD sites. This resulted in more children benefiting from Government subsidy:

- Conditional grant from 11 128 -11 361
- Equitable share from 47 552 50 319 transferred.

Sixty-four officials were also transferred to the Department of Education and labour was also consulted.

#### **Fee Exemption Policy**

The Fee Exemption Policy give parents who cannot afford to pay school fees at a feepaying school the opportunity to approach the school to request fee exemption. The department has budgeted R10 million for the purpose of reimbursing schools that have exempted parents from payment of school fees.

#### **Infrastructure Development**

The construction of new schools remains crucial in addressing the issues of overcrowding which is mainly due to migration, establishment of new settlements and in some instances improved performance of schools that leads preference of parents to certain individual schools.

Currently three schools are progressing between 0% and 25% and are Morena Tshohisi at 12%, Arbeidsgenot at 12% and Matlafalang at 5%. The two schools are progressing between 51% and 75% and those are Tshehetso at 72% and Katlego Mpumelelo at 70%. The one school, Malebogo is currently at 94% and will be completed in the first quarter of the new financial year.

The most affected areas where there were infrequent water supply was in Thabo Mofutsanyana District, Xhariep District and few municipalities in Fezile Dabi District. For the year under review a total number of 12 schools were provided with additional water supply through drilling of boreholes and provision of Jojo tanks or reservoirs.

The programme of conversion of toilets into waterborne flushing toilets continued in Thabo Mofutsanyana and Motheo Districts and total of 53 schools were converted and provided with flushing toilets. To address energy challenges a total number of 6 schools were provided with generators.

Currently construction of technical workshops which caters for Automotive, Civil, Construction and EGD has started in three schools, Boaramelo, Wongalethu and Reikaeletse in Xhariep with progress currently at 37%, 43% and 70% respectively at the three schools. The objective is to expand access to requisite skills to schools as identified by curriculum.

The progress convert Tempe into school of skills is at 94% and skills to be offered include Automotive, Electrical, Electronics, refrigeration Plumbing and Welding.

Reamohetse Art School progress is currently at 77% with the following additions in progress, construction of a new dance hall and conversion of existing classrooms into various facilities such as arts and culture studios.

Construction of Grade R classes at 9 schools is taking place with 6 of the Grade R classrooms that have reached completion.

Three special schools, Leboneng, Boitumelong and Trompsburg were identified to receive new hostel facilities. Progress in construction at the three schools is currently at 90%, 10% and 0% respectively. The conversion of Laurie Park into Autism School is currently in progress and phase one has been completed and phase two will be starting in the new financial year.

The allocated budget for 2023/24 financial year is R534.9 million. In 2023 the Free State NSNP beneficiaries to benefit from this programme will be capped at 597 600 learners and

the creation of work opportunities will be extended to 3 395 Volunteer Food Handlers (VFHs) and 120 NSNP assistants.

# 4. Reprioritisation

Department's equitable share was reprioritised or reduced with R9 million in 2023/24 financial year towards service delivery and other provincial pressures.

## 5. Procurement

Free State Department of Education Supply Chain aligns itself with the provision PFMA which promotes economy, efficiency, effectiveness, and transparency in the use of state resources. Consequently, a key duty, amongst others, for the accounting officers/authorities (AOs/AAs) in terms of the PFMA are to establish and maintain an appropriate procurement and provisioning system which is fair, equitable, transparent, competitive, and cost-effective. In terms of section 6(2) of the PFMA, the National Treasury must prescribe uniform treasury norms and standards. This includes prescribing norms and standards to limit and prevent the abuse of the SCM system and the enforcement. In terms of section 18(2) of the PFMA, the provincial treasuries must enforce the prescribed norms and standards in their respective provinces.

The implementation of the Procurement Compliance Processes (PCP) within SCM unit continues to be an integral part of compliance checks and reduces risk expose for irregular expenditure, fruitless and wasteful expenditure, and unauthorised expenditure. SCM has revived the quarterly physical/contact sessions of SCM forums (after covid -19) which aims to resolve SCM related challenges and to share good practices across Departments. SCM has also establish a new departmental publication called "Lebenkele la tsebo, Knowledge Café" which aims to close SCM knowledge gap, this publication is circulated each month on a bulk mail. All these efforts are to reduce irregular expenditure, fruitless and wasteful expenditure, and Unauthorised expenditure.

# 6. Receipts and financing

During the preliminary allocation we have received R593.749 million additional funding in 2023/24 financial year and R648.536 million in 2024/25 financial year towards improvement in conditions of services. In 2025/26 financial year we have been allocated additional funding of R1.291 billion of which R4.587 million towards learner transport, R0.721 million towards sanitary towels and dignity packs, R12.559 million towards migration of ECD and R1.273 billion towards improvement in conditions of services. Department's also received R2.504 million in 2023/24 financial year and R6.746 million in 2024/25 financial year towards appointment of 25 social workers.

The table also compares actual and budget receipts against actual and budgeted payments. The Department receives its funding through a provincial allocation and conditional grants.

#### The following priorities will be implemented under Infrastructure Development:

#### Construction of new schools and hostels

The Department is implementing 16 new schools and/or hostels at different IDMS stages. An allocation amounting to R200,626 million has been set aside for this purpose. The focus on providing new schools in rapidly expanding areas like Mangaung is receiving priority. Projects for the construction of three new schools is already in procurement in this area, while one has been occupied during 2021/22.

Special schools are also receiving attention. A project for the construction of a new special school and hostel in Trompsburg and a new hostel for Boitumeleng Special school are in procurement stage, while the hostel for Leboneng Special School is already under construction.

#### Refurbishment and rehabilitation

The Department allocated R115.000 million for Refurbishment and Rehabilitation of schools and hostels, this is to improve the quality of education and to make it accessible to all.

#### **Upgrades and additions**

The Department allocated R316.003 million for upgrades and additions projects, these includes the completion of the sanitation appropriate for education (SAFE) and eradication of Pit toilets in the entire province's schools, construction of additional classrooms, ablution facilities, Grade R classes, nutrition centres, administration blocks and perimeter fencing at schools. Furthermore, The Department commenced with the rolling out of alternative electricity supply to various schools across the province to cut down on excessive municipal electricity billing. Provision of reliable water supply to hostels is also receiving priority through drilling of boreholes and provision of water reservoirs.

#### Maintenance (Table B5)

The maintenance of schools continues to receive attention and an amount of R106.201 million has been allocated for this. The Department is in the process of putting a term contract for contractors to improve on the turnaround time for addressing maintenance needs reported by schools. The maintenance plan is developed on an annual basis as part of requirements for the conditional grant. The plan covers both the scheduled maintenance and non-scheduled or day to day maintenance. In the 2022/23 financial year, 34 schools have been covered through scheduled maintenance. The condition assessment has been allocated to one of the implementing agents and appointment of service providers will be finalised in the new financial year.

#### **Human resource capacity building (Table B5)**

The Department has done exceptionally well to attract built environment skills, through head hunting process, the Department was able to appoint Chief Quantity Surveyor, Civil Technician, Electrical Engineer, Mechanical Engineer, GIS Technician, two Quantity Surveyors, recruited wide range of technical skill as work inspectors in build environment, and managed to place learners who studied in China as work inspectors.
