#### Overview

#### **Vision**

United, prosperous, and productive agricultural sector for sustainable rural communities.

#### **Mission**

To promote food security and economic growth through sustainable agricultural development.

#### Main services

The Limpopo Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (LDARD) aims to lead and support sustainable agriculture and promote rural development in the Province through governance, knowledge development and transfer, regulatory function, and financial support to agriculture.

The challenging economic challenges experienced at the start of the 2022/23 have permeated into the current 2023/24 financial year for the agricultural sector and this was also fuelled by the outbreak of the Foot and Mouth Disease (FDM), persistent increase of the prices of key production inputs, namely fertilisers and fuel, compounded by electricity load shedding. The impact of Russia/Ukraine conflict is continuing to put pressure on the agricultural sector in particular, and the entire economy in general as this is also felt on the fruit export logistics in terms of the resultant delays in the shipping of the produce. The outbreak of Avian Influenza has posed a serious challenge in the poultry industry which resulted in a shortage of eggs and chicken meat products during this 2023/24 financial year.

Measures to control the outbreak of FMD are continuing and highly intensified during the 2023/24 Financial Year. No FMD outbreak has been reported in the past 12 months according to the DALRRD 2021-2023 FMD report. This is a positive development for the meat and meat product export sales to Saudi Arabia, which could potentially see an increase in their market share, particularly for beef exports. The South African agricultural sector is poised to benefit from this agreement, as the red meat industry is expected to experience a lift in export sales. The deal covers both livestock and livestock products, with the volumes of beef exports from South Africa expected to rise, particularly to the Middle East regions. Currently, 4% of the beef produced in the country is exported.

Veterinary Services has gone through Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) outbreaks on a yearly basis since 2018. The 2022 FMD outbreak which started in February 2022 had its last positive FMD case in April 2022.Limpopo has the country's longest border lines with Zimbabwe, Botswana, Mozambique and including the Kruger National Park (KNP). FMD is endemic in the Kruger National Park and Limpopo has the largest FMD protection zone. The outbreak of FMD in 2022 resulted in the expansion of Disease Management area in May 2022 to include Musina, Thulamela, Collins Chabane and the eastern part of Makhado along the N1 highway. The extra vigilant efforts during the 2023/24 financial year aims at ensuring full control of FMD. A widespread FMD surveillance (clinical and serological) in bovines was undertaken.

The DMA was shrunken on the 8th of September 2022 to include only part of Thulamela, and Collins Chabane. All 34 FMD outbreaks since 2019 were closed with the World Organisation for Animal Health (WOAH) in August 2023. Continuous disease surveillance and boots on the ground in the entire province for early warning and rapid response remain key. The traceability system and biosecurity are the cornerstone in animal disease control. Limpopo is piloting the rollout of the Livestock Identification and Traceability System (LITS).

The resolution of the outbreaks in the province with WOAH has had positive in spinoffs. Beef markets open in Saudi Arabia and China. Future visits by other countries are on the pipeline e.g. Indonesia.

Limpopo remains vulnerable to transboundary animal diseases such as Peste des Petits Ruminant (PPR), Contagious Bovine Pleuropneumonia and Strain O of FMD from our northern and eastern neighbours. The current outbreaks of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza in the country including in Limpopo province is a sure sign of climate change. Our province is in the cold face of those devastating pathogens. Veterinary Services should be fully resources and freed from bureaucratic red tape to respond to this economic and of health hazards.

Producers are continuously being assisted with planning information and agricultural spatial data through the Geographical Information Systems (GIS) products to improve production and utilise natural resources optimally. The Department has implemented a digital reporting system for extension and advisory services. This is a Geographical Information Systems (GIS) product developed for planning, reporting and to support timely decision making and monitoring. The system enables tracking of service delivery daily and electronic reporting of the indicators in the Annual Performance plan (APP). The integration of the GIS database and the reporting system has also enabled spatial analysis of services and support provided by the department to the producers in line with the service delivery model based on Agro-Ecological Zones (AEZ). Programmes 2 and 6 have been added on to the system and will be utilising the digital reporting system in the 3rd quarter of this financial year.

The agricultural sector could probably face challenging conditions this year (2023) and into 2024 due to ever escalation of the prices of the factors of production and trade. The input costs increased by more than 50 percent and this reduced the profits farmers gained from the much higher commodity prices. The livestock industry remains in solid condition, but farmers remain cautious of biosecurity cases like FMD and other diseases. On the flip side of the coin, the higher grain and oilseeds prices add further cost weights to the livestock and poultry

industry. EU continue to be the major market for South African Fruit. The country's fruit and nut exports amounted to US\$922.2 million in the first quarter of 2023, equivalent to a 9.6 percent decrease from the US\$1.0 billion reported in the same period in 2022. The decline in the value of the exports could be due to the export restrictions imposed by the EU to the citrus industry (NAMC Trade report: 2023).

Currently, the export industry is closing the curtain on the EU exports and contemplating handing over the burton to the handling of citrus demands to the northern hemisphere and the country account for 37 percent of citrus exports to the EU and this precisely due to the restrictions imposed on the industry.

The length of the Russia-Ukraine war and the severity of the damages will matter more for the upcoming season. This is specifically because Russia is the world's leading exporter of fertilizer materials, accounting for 14% of global exports in value terms.

High freight costs and escalation of higher cost of electricity, fuel and fertilizer and everpresence of loadshedding hinders growth in the sector and the profit margins of the farmers diminishes. The ongoing operational challenges at the country's ports pushes handling costs up.

#### Challenges faced by the Agricultural Sector

The Agricultural Sector is facing key challenges included, inter alia, the following:

- Rising input costs, such as electricity, fuel, and fertilisers
- Loadshedding
- Conflict between Russia and Ukraine
- Aging infrastructure such as bulk water irrigation infrastructure
- Price and availability of fertilisers
- Market logistics
- Inadequate producer support vs rising global competitiveness
- Competing land use between agriculture and other sectors
- Climate change, which increases the sector's vulnerability to natural disasters
- Outbreak of Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD)
- Poor management of resources in communal areas such as overgrazing, vandalism
  of infrastructure (fences, livestock handling facilities) and the increasing rate of
  resources degradation

• Conflicts on community owned projects impacting on development.

#### Proposed strategies to overcome the challenges include the following:

- Implementation of the Agriculture and Agro-Processing Master Plan (AAMP)
- Forging and strengthening partnerships on the implementation of RAAVC projects
- Implementation of projects with the support of Strategic Partners
- Continued support to producers through the Farmer Support Policy
- Conflict Management and mediation in partnership with the South African Association on Mediators (SAAM)
- Use of technology to support alternative energy sources.

The response by the Department to disasters is also key in mitigating some of the challenges faced. The Limpopo Province continues to experience serious deterioration of agricultural resources due to persisting impacts of disasters such as drought, floods, and animal diseases. In line with the approved Comprehensive Agricultural Disaster Risk Management Plan the Department continues to implement the strategic actions identified that focus on proactive approaches to disaster risk reduction and mitigation. In terms of the legislation, the Provincial Government is obligated to maintain and repair all Provincial Agriculture Dams. Dam Safety inspections must be done every 5 years to comply with Dam Safety Regulations as in the National Water Act, Act 36 of 1998. These inspections and maintenance are being done based on the availability of financial resources.

The implementation of the Revitalisation of Agriculture and Agro processing Value Chain (RAAVC) Plan is gaining momentum with the ultimate objective to contribute to the expansion and increase of agricultural production across the value chain, and in turn the sector's inclusive growth, job creation and food security as espoused by the National Development Plan.

During 2023/24 the Department is implementing five (05) RAAVC projects. The development at the projects covers a wide range of activities, namely, irrigation infrastructure, orchards development, packaging, and storage and ablution facilities to meet phytosanitary requirements, production inputs and mechanisation support. Approximately 2 294 hectares are being developed with the focus on the following strategic commodity clusters: Vegetables, inclusive of potatoes, Fruits such as citrus and macadamia nuts, Grains, and Industrial crops such as cotton. One of the projects implemented in the Citrus Cluster is Majeje Sitrus in Ba-Phalaborwa Municipality. The project started in 2021 following the completion of Gravelotte, Seloane and Prieska (GRASP)'s feasibility study in 2016/17.

Other RAAVC projects funded include Tafelkop Farmers Association, Mogalatsane irrigation Scheme, Kopano Citrus, and Magadimana Citrus which are all in Sekhukhune District. Tshilwavusiku Secondary Cooperative is in Vhembe District, and the Potato belt in Capricorn District. All these projects are underway at various stages of implementation.

Progress on other key areas of performance information as at the end of the third quarter of 2023/24 financial year, can be summarised as follows:

- The Department established 69 agricultural infrastructures and has already surpassed the annual target of 46. As regards to infield irrigation, 201,6 hectares were equipped. This represents an overachievement of the annual target of 176. Notable progress has been made with the revitalization of one of the irrigation schemes which was not complete during the last financial year
  - Mogalatsane Irrigation scheme The development of Mogalatsane irrigation scheme infrastructure is at 100% completion. It is worth noting that the scheme will now change from rain fed production to irrigation
  - Tafelkop Farmers Association Revitalization of the scheme includes bulk water supply and in-field irrigation system development, establishment of shade nets covering 1ha each plot, refurbishment of packing facility, construction of ablution facilities and storage facility to ensure compliance with SAGAP market requirements. By the end of quarter 3, phases 1 and 2 were fully completed.
- Efficient water use systems are initiative by the department to mitigate against climate change so as environmentally controlled production structure. Farmers are assisted in this regard during the financial year. The Department is providing continual assistance to farmers on planning and application for water rights. To promote the adoption of climate smart agriculture technologies 2 559 hectares were rehabilitated as against an annual target of 1 400, by the end of quarter 3, 454,82 hectares were cultivated under Conservation Agriculture practises and 1 405,6 hectares cleared of alien invasive plants. Service delivery on the targets relating to the promotion of sustainable use and management of natural agricultural resources, is on track to achieve the respective annual targets. Creation of green jobs through upstream and downstream agricultural activities with the total of 1 234 green jobs were created through agro processing and irrigation expansion. Farmers to the total number of 859 were assisted through disaster relief schemes and 05 surveys on the uptake of early warning information conducted. The Department is providing continuous awareness on drought and Foot and Mouth Disease outbreak to all livestock farmers.

- The Department increased participation of producers in the integrated value chain through support to 23 083 producers across different commodity groups (cotton, citrus, red meat, grain, vegetable, and sub-tropical). Optimal support to the grain commodity is affected by the higher fertilizer prices that has doubled with suppliers not being able to supply.
- Production stock to the total of 10 180 was provided to farmers, covering fish breeding and livestock. Performance is on track to achieve the annual targets for breeding livestock whilst annual target for fish breeding stock is already achieved. A total number of 2 243 producers as against an annual target of 940, were capacitated through demonstrations and facilitation of 357 farmers' days as against an annual target of 260. To promote agrarian transformation, 13 stakeholder engagements for post settlement support were facilitated. Food security was promoted through support to 1 072 small holder producers and 11 373 subsistence producers. Monitoring and reporting on performance in this core Agricultural Producer Support and Development Programme is enhanced by the Digital Reporting System. The Digital Reporting System enables Programme Managers to access performance in real time and intervene when performance is not in line with targets set, resulting in this Programme being on track to achieve most annual targets set for 2023/24.
- The Department increased participation of producers in the integrated value chain through support to producers across different commodity groups (cotton, citrus, red meat, grain, vegetable, and sub-tropical). Optimal support to the grain commodity is affected by the higher fertilizer prices that has doubled with suppliers not being able to supply.
- Over and above the control and management of the FMD and other biosecurity measures the Department implemented, included 8 410 contact visits to the epidemiological units for veterinary interventions, conducted 202 sessions of FMD vaccinations and 2 892 dipping sessions on communal cattle. To reduce the level of risks associated with food, and 383 inspections on facilities producing meat were conducted, especially at abattoirs slaughtering cattle from FMD affected properties. A total of 42 172 laboratory tests were performed according to approved standards. To address and promote the welfare of animals, animal identification and advisory services 7 Performing Animals Protection Act (PAPA) registration licenses were issued. As part of a response to the FMD outbreak in the Vhembe District, the Department was supported with additional financial resources which had to a larger extent, assisted with the implementation of necessary interventions needed manage the outbreak and contain the spread. of FMD in Vhembe District. The Department was able to conduct a successful vaccination programme, wherein cattle

- were vaccinated, conducted extensive disease surveillance, conducted roadblocks to control the movement of cloven-hoofed animals in order to curb the spread.
- To enhance research and development, technology transfer services consisted of 5 interventions. These interventions included the participation of researchers at the South African Society of Agriculture Extension (SASAE) Conference where researchers presented their research findings.

#### **Outlook for the coming financial year (2024/25)**

The agricultural sector continues to experience challenges that affect the overall growth of the sector. Key among these are rising cost of inputs, such as fuel and fertilisers; effects of climate change, which increases the sector's vulnerability to natural disasters, poor management of resources in communal areas such as overgrazing, vandalism of infrastructure (fences, livestock handling facilities) and the increasing rate of resources degradation; biosecurity issues which include livestock stock diseases, specifically Foot and Mouth (FMD) and crop pests and diseases; and competing land use between agriculture and other sectors. The continuation of the Russia-Ukraine conflict is and continues to affect the sector and is a cause for concern for the upcoming seasons and going forward as this has a potential to leave an indelible negative mark. This is specifically because Russia is the world's leading exporter of fertilizer materials, accounting for 14% of global exports in value terms.

Programmes of the department in 2024/25 will therefore be focused on the support to producers towards mitigating the impact of these challenges.

It is worth noting though that this would be undertaken in a continued strained environment in terms of reduced financial resources and escalation of the prices of the factors of production and trade. As stated, the input costs have increased by more than 50% and this reduced the income the farmers gained from the much higher commodity prices.

The implementation of the RAAVC plan in collaboration with the private sector and relevant public entities would be intensified further with the launch having taken place in November 2023. The participation of producers in the integrated value chain would be increased through the support to 9 804 producers across different commodity groups.

The impact of rising food prices continues to threaten the food security status of the citizens, particularly that of vulnerable households. As part of intervention, food security will be promoted through support to 786 small holder producers and 5 000 subsistence producers in the form of production inputs and infrastructure. Furthermore, 940 producers will be capacitated through targeted technical on-site demonstrations.

Implementation of biosecurity interventions will include 2 200 dipping sessions of cattle on communal areas and 10 100 visits to epidemiological units would be conducted for veterinary interventions. To reduce the level of risks associated with food, 470 inspections on facilities producing meat will be conducted and 30 100 laboratory tests performed according to approved standards. Programme on the prevention of the outbreak FMD will continue. 222 sessions of FMD vaccinations would be conducted. Furthermore, in collaboration with the national Department of Agriculture, Land reform and Rural Development, SANParks and livestock industry necessary measures and interventions to keep the disease at bay would be implemented. This includes key among others:

- a. Minimizing contact between cattle and buffalo by keeping the fences of the Kruger National Park and surrounding community game reserves properly maintained
- b. A continuous and timeous supply of FMD vaccine is very paramount to keep to the annual vaccination schedule, of 4 times a year, in the protection zone in line with legislative requirement
- c. Completion of the upgrading the three strategic Provincial Veterinary Laboratories for approval by DALRRD and accreditation by the South African National Accreditation System (SANAS) so they handle and run lab tests for animal diseases
- d. Continuation of animal handling rehabilitation project, which would include construction of additional new and upgrading of existing facilities. This infrastructure is central in enabling basic primary animal health care
- e. FMD Zone Red Meat Value Chain Development Programme: In response to the Market challenges experienced by livestock farmers within the Redline Zone. The Department in collaboration with DALRRD, ARC, Mopani and Vhembe Districts has started a process to establish the Red Meat Value Chain system which is aimed at to improving market opportunities for the FMD affected farmers and communities in the Redline area. The programme entails, the establishment of two Livestock Custom Feedlots and an Abattoir to offset sustainable off-takes
- f. Livestock Identification and Traceability System (LITS): A mass roll-out of the LITS in the FMD Controlled zone in 2024/25 to assist in curbing illegal movement of cattle.

#### Reprioritisation

The department has aligned the 2024 MTEF allocation to the Key policy priorities of government including the National Development plan, Provincial Development and Departmental policies in relation to farmer support and development. The function of Rural Development has been shifted from programme three to a new programme of rural

Development to ensure proper facilitation and management of Development of rural areas within the Province of Limpopo.. In addition, the Department has made provision within the baseline for catering of COE related adjustment as determined by Treasury and DPSA.

The Department is funded by both equitable share and conditional grant. For 2024/25 the department has been allocated R1.783 billion and R1.887 billion in 2025/26 and R1.962 billion in 2026/27 financial year. For 2024/25 the Equitable Share amount to R1.462 billion or 82 percent whilst conditional grants amount to R320.960 million or 18 percent of the total allocation. The conditional grants allocated are Land Care at R13.674 million, CASP at R247.211 million, EPWP Integrated grant at R4.753 million and illima/Letsema at R55.322 million. The Departmental allocation over the MTEF increased by R11.826 million or 0.7 percent, R104.471 million or 5.9 percent, and R74.725 million 4 percent from 2024/25, 2025/26 and 2026/27 respectively.

#### **Departmental Receipts**

Table 4.1 (b) below provide departmental own revenue estimates over the seven-year period. The department estimates to collect R14.779 million in 2024/25, R15.534 million in 2025/26 and R16.240 million in 2026/27. The main sources of revenue are College fees, sale of assets, commission on insurance and agricultural produce. The Department's capacity to collect revenue will be affected should the envisaged function shift of the Colleges to National Department of Agriculture Land Reform and Rural Development be finalised over the MTEF period.

The Department's budget structure has conformed to the uniform programme structure prescribed for the Agriculture and Rural development sector. For 2024/25 MTEF, The Department's programmes have increased from seven programme to eight programme which include Rural Development as outlined in tables 4.2(a) above. The Bulk of the department's budget allocation is mainly Service Delivery functions at 79.2 percent while support or Administration has been allocated 20.8 percent. Within the allocation, the Department receives four conditional grants amounting to total allocation of R320.960 million or 18.0 percent and equitable Share constitute R1.461 billion 82.0 percent.

The allocation conditional are Comprehensive Agriculture Support programme which has a budget of R247.211 million, illima/Letsema Projects grant with an allocation of R55.322 million, Land Care Programme grant with an allocation of R13.674 million and EPWP programme from Department of Labour with an allocation of R4.753 million, the other grants are from National Department of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development. In terms of the allocation per programme, **Programme one** (Administration) has been allocated R370.634 million which is an increase by R31.571 million or 9.3 percent in 2024/25. In 2025/26 financial year, the programme has been allocated R366.751 million which is a decrease of R11.332 million or 8.3 percent, the outer year has been allocated R383.204 million which an increase of 4.5 percent.

**Programme two (Sustainable Resource use and Management)** has been allocated R125.449 million which is a decrease of R11.332 million or 8.3 percent from the previous year allocation. Within the allocation is the amount of R13.674 million for Land Care conditional grant and R4.753 million for EPWP Integrated grant.

**Programme Three (Agriculture Producer Support and Development)** has been allocated a budget of R759.217 million which is a reduction of R36.110 million or 4.5 percent. The reduction includes the shifting of Rural Development sub-programme to Programme 8. Within the budget allocation is the allocation for CASP and illima Letsema which has been allocated R201.000 million and R55.322 million respectively.

**Programme four (Veterinary Services)** has been allocated R216.059 million which is an increase of R22.872 million or 11.8 percent. The increase includes the additional allocation of R17.000 million for Foot and mouth programme to cater for related administrative costs for the programme. Within the allocation of veterinary services is the allocation of **R4.500 million** from the CASP grant to fund the FMD response.

Programme five (Research and Technology Development) has been allocated R87.521 million which is an increase of R12.840 million or 17.2 percent. The increase is attributed to the allocation for the maintenance for the research stations in response to the approved strategy on Revitalization of Research Stations.

**Programme 6 or Agriculture Economics Services** has been allocated R68.414 million which is a decrease of R5.442 million or 7.4 percent. The decrease in attributed to the budget cut on COE.

Programme 7 (Agriculture Education and Training) has been allocated R149.031 million. The 2024/25 allocation is a reduction of R8.860 million or 5.6 percent from the previous year allocation. Within the allocation is a budget of R21.345 million from CASP to fund the revitalisation of Colleges infrastructure. The reduction is mainly on goods and services due to budget cuts.

**Programme 8 or Rural Development** has been allocated R6.287 million. this is a new programme which its functions were previously held under programme three.

For 2024/2025 current payment has been allocated R1.577 billion or 88.5 percent of the Departmental allocation. Transfers and Subsidies has been allocated R34.436 million or 1.9 percent of the Departmental total allocation. The allocation include R36 million for RAAVC projects and Payment for Capital Assets has been allocated R170.811 million or 9.6 percent of the Departmental allocation.

In terms of the **Compensation of employees** the Department has allocated R1.106 billion which is an increase of R38.327 million or 3.6 percent. The increase includes the carry through of the 2023/24 recruitment plan appointments and the provision for the conditions of employment related costs. The Departmental received an additional allocation of R17.000 million to augment the budget shortfall on COE and R4.332 million for CPI adjustment provision.

**Goods and services** have been allocated R471.043 million which is an increase of R16.348 million or 3.6 percent form 2023/24 allocation. The small increase is attributed to the reduction of the budget for illima/Letsema and EPWP which has decreased by R21.270 million and R3.840 million respectively.

**Transfers and Subsidies** allocation amount to R34.436 million which represent decrease of R45.450 million or 56.9 percent. The reduction is due to the change in the strategy of e-voucher which could not be implemented from 2023/24 financial year. within the Transfers and Subsidies is the R36.000 million for RAAVC projects.

**Payment of Capital Assets** allocation increases by R2.607 million or 1.6 percent from the 2023/24 financial year

For 2024/25 financial year the Department has allocated a budget of R206.260 million million which represents an increase of R19.236 million or 10.5 percent from 2023/24 financial year.

**Maintenance and repairs:** The 2024/25 budget for maintenance and repair of infrastructure has increased by R6.166 million or 62.7 percent compared to 2023/24 FY. The budget will be utilized to maintain colleges infrastructure and Agro-Ecological Zones buildings to improve the accommodation space and making the premises more user friendly to the end users. The department as the custodian of some of the dams within the province has been mandated to maintain and repair the dams to avoid collapsing; 54.0 percent of the maintenance budget is allocated for the repair of the identified dams.

In the outer years, 2025/26 and 2026/27,the budget increases by 23.0 percent and 30.0 percent respectively to enable the completion of the maintained infrastructure and commence with new maintenance activities for Agric Zone Offices, Animal Handling Facilities, and dams. The outbreak of FMD in the province has also prompt intensifying of construction and repairs of animal handling facilities to assist with the control of spreading the disease.

**Upgrades and Additions:** The 2024/25 allocation show a decrease of R8.531 million or 7.9 percent in the year, 2025/26 the allocation decreased by R9.528 million or 9.5 percent and 2026/27 increased by R45.452 million or 50.5 percent to support individual agricultural projects which requires upgrades and additions for increase of production to enable them to enter competitive markets and comply with Good Agricultural Practises.

Refurbishment and Rehabilitation: The 2024/25 MTEF allocations provide for the continuous refurbishment and rehabilitation of departmental offices and research stations and RAAVC projects. The rehabilitation of Zebediela Citrus estate which is one of the RAAVC projects will assist in improving the economic performance of the province and assisting in limiting the challenges of poverty, unemployment, and inequality. Veterinary facilities require rehabilitation to comply with the SANAS requirements. In 2023/24 total budget of R4.500 million was allocated to put the standards of the departmental laboratories in the required standards. This work will continue in 2024/25. For 2023/24, the allocation amount to R16.310 million which represents an increase of R2.960 million or 22.2 percent as a result of additional to fund the refurbishment of the Veterinary Laboratories. The total budget under this category decreases in 2024/25 financial by R3.190 million or 19.5 percent and increases by R8.000 million or 41.0 percent in 2025/26 and decreases by R1.428 million or 5.2 percent in 2026/27 financial year.

New or replaced infrastructure: From the current budget, there is increase by R9.061 million or 26.1 percent in 2024/25 and increase by R9.486 million or 21.6 percent in 2025/26 and a decrease by R38.552 million or of 72.3 percent in the previous financial year. Capital relates to the construction of new departmental offices, as well as the development of agricultural infrastructure such as, irrigation schemes, boreholes, stock watering etc. There is an indication of budget decrease in the outer years due to the need to construct new offices because of the current situation of dilapidated buildings. The Mopani district is the mostly affected region with offices which needs relocation. For the 2024/25, two (02) office accommodation units will be constructed, the Mopani District Office joined together with North Agro-Ecological Zone and Mopani West Agro-Ecological Zone.

**Infrastructure Transfers:** An amount of R26.000 million has been allocated which is an increase of R14.000 million or 116.7 percent in 2024/25 financial year. The amount will be transferred to Impact catalyst for the implementation of five (05) mega projects namely Majeje Citrus, TATS Greenery, Monyetla Holdings, Kgarose Kgaros Pty LTD and Zebediela Citrus. **Non-Infrastructure:** An amount of R1.350 million has been allocated which is increased to cater for planning and monitoring of RAAVC projects.

Programme 1 (Administration) has been allocated with R370.634 million for 2024/25 financial year. This constitutes an increase of R31.571 million or 9.31 percent from 2023/24 financial year. The increase of the allocation with more than the CPI is a result of the correction of the compensation of employees in corporate Services as part of the implementation of the organisational structure, the provision of non-negotiables and contractual obligations. The programme continues to be responsible for the centralised services which are funded through contractual and non-negotiables. R3.000 million has been allocated for the revitalisation of ICT infrastructure which funded over the MTEF period.

**Compensation of Employees (COE)** has been allocated R247.723 million for 2024/25 financial year which is an increase of R27.801 million or 12.6 percent from 2022/23 financial year.

**Goods and Services:** has been allocated R115.660 million which is an increased of R4.609 million or 4.2 percent. The departmental organisational structure was reviewed and approved during 2022/23 financial year. Process has started in the implementation of the new structure which shows a substantial reduction of post and costs centres The Department is in the process of filling the identified critical posts approved by Provincial Personnel Management Committee (PPMC). Strides have been made since 2018/19 to fill all approved vacant posts.

The above table reflect the overall allocation amounting to R1.106 billion, for 2024/25, R1.150 billion and 2025/26 R1.203 billion. Provision has been adequately made for the carry-through costs of the filled posts, 1.5 percent Pay Progression, medical aid adjustments as per CPI guidelines, additional posts, internship and 150 vacant posts. Included in the R1.068 billion allocation is Equitable Share of R1.023 billion and Conditional Grants of R44.914 million to cater for CASP Extension Recovery personnel. Furthermore, the department funds interns and graduate programme (shown in the category Others). For the period 2022/23 the department advertised and filled 58 vacant posts. The department submitted request to Provincial Treasury during August 2022 to advertise 139 critical vacant posts but was since erroneously disapproved during January 2023. The fluctuation in the personnel numbers is due to implementation of approved organisational structure and contract workers due to FMD

Outbreak who are hired on a short-term basis. The department is planning to fill 150 vacant posts over the 2023/24 MTEF, which have been adequately budgeted for.
