Baseline Assessment



Growth trends

	2007/08	2008/09	2009/10
Central administration	11,5%	12,8%	10,5%
Financial & administrative	12,3%	7,3%	3,6%
Social Services	8,3%	8,9%	5,9%
Protection Services	5%	6,9%	6,8%
Economic Services	11,6%	10,9%	5,8%

- Overall growth of 9,4% in 2007/08, 10,1% in 2008/09 and 6,7% in 2009/10
- Funding level may be ahead of spending and delivery capacity 2005/06 outcome and March 'spike' exercise
- May be cases where medium-term baseline estimates are adjusted downwards



Reprioritisation within baseline

- Strong growth in medium-term baseline allows for extensive reprioritisation
- First step show changes to budget structure as in 2006 Appropriation Bill
 - CFO and DG letter, and attachments
- Opportunity for departments to:
 - Evaluate growth trends
 - Propose changes to programme structure and measurable objectives
- Remember that: new funding will focus on key priorities and plans, instead of overall increases to all departments



Programme evaluation and format of database



Definition of programme

• OECD:

A group of activities intended to contribute to an identifiable set of government objectives (for example crop development). A programme should have an identifiable target population; a defined budget, staffing and other necessary resources; and clearly defined objectives and outputs

Another definition:

A programme is a group of independent, but closely related services or activities, designed to achieve common goals or objectives



Programme evaluation

- Current budget structure for many departments
 limit proper evaluation
- Main division not always the same as programme
- Opportunity for departments to structure their budgets to better reflect programme objectives, and also improve evaluation
- Outcome may result in changes to programme structure
- Joint exercise between departments and Treasury budget analysts



New database

- Supports new approach and provides greater flexibility
- Improves budget evaluation
- Clear split between non-recurrent and recurrent
- Departments and budget analysts decide on level of disaggregation
- Includes schedule for infrastructure and new funding



New spending proposals



New spending proposals

- Aligned with policy priorities and include:
 - Detailed costing
 - Spending plans over the MTEF
 - Legislative plans where applicable
 - Administrative plans (consider personnel, accommodation and other administrative costs)
 - Implementation plans
- Should also be practical and affordable
- Attempt to reach agreement with Treasury budget analysts on new funding
